7 Soccer meeting and I won't go through the

8 whole meeting, but just the points I think

9 that you would be most interested in, and as

10 usual this week when I get back home I'll send

11 you a full report to the entire membership of

12 basically the talking points of the U.S.

First thing that they discussed, they did say that the U.S. Soccer audit has been completed for the last fiscal year and it will go through committee for review and then it will be released to the entire membership, but it has been completed.

it has been completed.The Women's National Team, as everyone

knows, they are looking for a general managerfor the Women's National Team. They had

23 approximately 80 applicants who were

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interested in the job. They brought it down to eleven where they are today.

3 There's eleven candidates that still

4 remain and within the next few weeks or month

5 they want to bring that number down to five or

6 six candidates and actually bring the five,

7 six candidates into Chicago to do a live

8 interview with the five or six to recommend to

9 the Board of Directors who would be the

10 Women's National Team General Manager.

On membership, they reported that they

12 have gone a long way in the relationship with

13 the membership and one of the things they have

14 said at the meeting that they are doing a lot

15 more face time and coming to a lot of events

16 from all the members around the country and we

17 can attest to that because at our U.S. Soccer

18 National Championship in Milwaukee last year

19 we had a good presence of U.S. Soccer there.

20 We had Dan Flynn. We had Ryan Mooney. We

21 had Caitlin. At our AGM in Buffalo they also

22 gave us or took a lot of support for our

23 event, so they are definitely sending a lot

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more people out to support the member's events

2 and show that they are part of us and do

3 support everyone in the organization.

4 They also sent out a monthly member update

which everyone in here should receive, so that

6 was another piece of their commitment to

7 getting more involved with the membership.

The next annual membership meeting that

9 they do once a year where they bring everybody

10 in, I think they announced it this week, will

11 be the week of April -- between April 3 and 6

12 so I think they've got three meeting dates

scheduled where they are going to invite you

14 to come down to Frisco, Texas, so they are

15 going to hold the events at the National

16 Soccer Hall of Fame in Frisco.

17 If anybody hasn't been there yet -- I

18 haven't been there. It was my daughter's

wedding when they opened the place, but Iheard it's an incredible experience. A lot of

21 hands-on interactive games, so if you get

22 invited to go down to Frisco, take advantage

23 of it and take advantage of visiting the Hall

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of Fame because I have heard it's an 1

2 incredible experience, so that will be during

the week of April 3 through 6. 3

4 The one thing that, again, we talked about

5 this last year and I'll bring it up again and

6 that is the Innovate to Growth, Growth Fund.

7 As we all know, U.S. Soccer commits \$3 million

a year to the membership to grow soccer in 8

9 this country.

10 This year I believe they had -- put my glasses back on -- I don't have the number of 11 total. Twenty-three applications and they

12 13 gave us seventeen payouts for a total of

\$1.3 million. The one thing that they 14

15 mentioned at the meeting today is that the

majority of those seventeen deals with youth. 16

17 The youth are doing a very good job applying for these funds. They would like to 18

see a lot more diversity. They would like to 19

20 see a lot more coming from our group, the

21 adults, referees and coaches, which they don't

get a lot of from those three groups and I 22

urge everyone when it comes up next year, put 23

an application in because that is free money to everyone.

The one thing I have heard in the past is 3 the process, the grant process, was too

cumbersome, very hard to do, 25 pages, but I 5

have heard that that has been reduced. It's 6

been a lot easier. The one thing they told us 7

8 at the last Board meeting, don't be afraid to

put something in because once it's in there

they will work with you to enhance it and to 10

put it to where it needs to be, so if you have 11

12 a great idea next year and you want some

13 funding for it, right, don't be afraid.

Send them something or call them because

that will start the process and they will 15

assist you throughout the rest of the process, 16

17 so I urge everyone, it's free money. If you

have a great idea put it out there. 18

Now, if it's something that's already 19

20 happening, and I'll give you an example. Last

year Tim Busch applied for walking soccer 21

which was a brand new initiative that nobody

23 has ever put in. Now, it doesn't mean that

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1 the next three state associations, if they

apply for walking soccer they are going to get

it because they have already given a grant for

that initiative. 4

5 So it's got to be something new, something

6 out of the box, something special that you

come up with that, you know, put it out there.

I mean, no is an answer and if you don't apply

you're not going to get anything, so I urge

everyone next year, take advantage of it when 10

11 the application comes out. If you need help

ask, but it's worth your time. 12

13 One thing that they did mention and

14 something that was interesting, FIFA has a

15 program which they've had since 2016 that they

call the FIFA Forward Program and that's a 16

17 program where they give millions of dollars,

if you qualify and you do the right thing, to 18

every national federation around the country, 19

20 and mind you there's 211 national federations

21 throughout the world.

22 So during 2016/18, U.S. Soccer received

\$1.5 million and that was supposed to be used 23

for operation costs and \$2.25 million to

invest in projects. In the next three years

from 2019 to 2022, U.S. Soccer could be

eligible for \$6 million which would be

\$4 million in operation assistance and then

\$2 million for projects. 6

U.S. Soccer every year, because there is 7

some criteria you have to meet to get the

maximum amount of money, right, you have to do 9

a whole bunch of certain things. U.S. Soccer 10

has met the maximum criteria every single 11

12 year, so they have gotten the total amount of

13 money that is allocated per national

federation. 14

Some of the projects that they have used 15

the money for in the last few years has been 16

17 the online coaches courses has been funded

18 through that. The new online Referee courses

has been funded with that money. The Bowman 19

Academy Showcases have all been funded with 20 that money, so it's not money that they are

22 using from the membership.

23 This is money they get directly from FIFA

1 to work on these projects and that's some of

2 the projects that they have used it for, so

going forward there's a little more money in

the pot. U.S. Soccer probably will get the 4

5 maximum every year and I just wanted to give

6 an update that that's what they use the money

7 for.

engagement of the Federation with the members, 10

11 there were two bylaw proposals, one by Tom

Moore and one by John Collins and the two 12

today and we're going to ask that everybody 16

1 If we can align together as two

2 organizations, just imagine the power and the

3 strength we have in U.S. Soccer, okay. On our

4 own we really do not have much power or much

effect on what goes on, but if we can align

9 and the Athletes together, the Youth and the

10 Amateurs. I know it's probably a dream but,

11 for example, if there is an election like

12 Cindy tomorrow and it was contested, if the

14 it has to be every state supported one person,

15 they can win. They can win the election.

We can try, you know, but to get 55 times

17 to 110 different -- there's not that many

18 because there are joint states -- to all agree

19 on one thing, I mean, we very seldom can agree

20 on one thing in this room and if you get twice

21 as many people in the room to agree on one

22 thing it's difficult.

Nothing is impossible, but it's difficult,

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but if we don't take that first step to try to

2 combine or unite with the Youth and make one

3 strong voice, we're always going to be nothing

4 out there, so my goal and I have asked Karon

5 Beyer, our secretary, and she will be meeting

6 with the secretary of the Youth to put

7 together a plan on possible meeting dates and

8 will it be conference calls or will it be a

9 live meeting, but I definitely think we are at

10 a time that we need to take that step and get

11 a closer relationship with our Youth

12 counterparts.

13 I mean, many of you are part of the Youth

14 also as joint states and those that are not, I

15 mean, they all have the same issues we have,

14 will be in a lot of trouble.

15 So I don't know what the answers are.

This is a big, big issue and also even if you 16

don't have youth players, you may have a youth 17

referee on a sideline at a game. There may be 18

a referee who maybe comes with his son who is

20 seventeen or sixteen years-old to do lines for

21 him.

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22 So according to the policy of U.S. Soccer, 23

and we're not going to get into the weeds with

this, and that's why I urge everyone to go 1

there tomorrow, is that if there is anybody

that's considered youth, that's under the age 3

Both United Soccer Coaches and the Armed 18

Forces Sports Council, we are associate 19

20 members of U.S. Soccer. We are both longtime

21 members, as I think you know.

Hold on one sec. I think on TV this makes 22

you look really bad when you drink, but I ran 23

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across the building to get here and I thought

I was going to have at least five minutes

before I came up here.

We are really here today -- we do have an 4

amendment to the Bylaws that will be on the

floor tomorrow at the National Council meeting 6

and we would like to ask for your positive

about it. Both, again, the Armed Forces 9

Sports Council and United Soccer Coaches are 10

members, but our category of membership is 11

called associate member. 12

Associate members are members of the

Federation that do not register players. As 14

associate members we are both -- we have the 15

right and the responsibility to vote for 16

bylaws, to vote for national officers, to vote 17

18 for the budget. We can nominate officers. We

can actually even run for the at-large Board 19

position which represents us. 20

21 What we cannot do is vote for the at-large

22 Board member that represents us, and what we

23 are actually asking for in this amendment is a

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1 single vote to vote for the Board member that

represents us. We simply think that's not

3 fair.

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Up until 2006 when, and probably many people in the room remember this, when we went

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people in the room remember this, when we wentfrom 40 plus Board members to the current 15,

7 at that time associate members actually had a

8 full seat on the Board and it was United

9 Soccer Coaches' executive director actually

10 sat on the Board for a number of years.

When it rolled from the 40 plus to the

12 current 15, all of the organizations that did

13 not essentially have an automatic seat on the

14 Board, such as the two Adult positions, the

15 two Youth Council positions, the Pro and the

16 Athlete positions, all the other organizations

7 were rolled into what is called the At-Large

18 Council and it is represented by a single

19 Board member who is the At-Large Board member.

We are not looking for an additional Board

21 member. All we're really asking for is to be

22 able to vote for the Board member that

represents us. Again, we can actually run for

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the Board. That is not our intention, but we
