PRESIDENT MOTTA: Next on the agenda would be the approval of our last AGM. Motion to approve?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Any corrections or additions? Seeing none, minutes are passed.
(Minutes confirmed.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: We're going to have a couple of speakers speak, so I would like to call on Brian Remedi who is with U.S. Soccer. He's the current Chief Administration Officer for the Federation. So Ryan?
(Applause.)
MR. REMEDI: Good afternoon. Thank you,

John. Really appreciate the opportunity to attend your meeting today and to be present here for your AGM weekend, so thank you very much.

I'd really like to also thank your entire Board for calling us here. I'll introduce a couple of my colleagues in a second, but it underscores certainly the good partnership that U.S. Soccer has with U.S. Adult Soccer and, again, very grateful to be with you here today.

I want to acknowledge a few of my colleagues who are here this weekend. I'm not sure if they are all in the room today. To my right in the corner I think you all know Caitlin Carducci. Raise your hand.

## (Applause.)

MR. REMEDI: And on a personal note, if you can stop coming up to me and telling me how great Caitlin is, that would be much appreciated. While it's great for her self-worth, it's a little bit damaging to my own.

I have two other colleagues that $I$ don't see here now, but Rick Eddy and Dan Russell were both here yesterday and they may both be around, so $I$ want to acknowledge and thank them also for being here.

Just for a couple of minutes $I$ just want to tell you something that $I$ have witnessed. I've been coming to your Amateur National Championship events for the last few years. I have attended the Steinbrecher Cup for the last few years and $I$ want to just tip my hat to you because what $I$ see in those moments when people are coming together for the athletes, and by athletes $I$ certainly mean the players, the coaches and the referees.

It's been very inspiring to me to see the hard work that goes into the event and $I$ certainly see the pride that you all have in the work that you do. I was at your national championship event which happened to be in Chicago, so you made it very easy for me, so thank you for that.

And just the effort that $I$ witnessed, it

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certainly underscores the commitment and the passion that you all have for this game and I certainly recall -- I don't know where Duncan is right now.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: He's right here.
MR. REMEDI: So sorry, Duncan. I
thought you did a great job that weekend.
Claudio, I saw you hustling around the whole time, whether it was moving bags of ice out to the field or coordinating with the referees and the teams that you both have with you to make that event great.

I want to just tell you, I thought you all did a great job with that and certainly something that everyone in this room should be proud of, so thank you.

## (Applause.)

MR. REMEDI: U.S. Soccer is very excited to work with USASA and to partner with you. I want to just call out quickly two things that are coming up, both of which you're well aware of.

The first is, as you know, we have a grant
program called Innovate to Grow. This is now a third cycle that we're in. The application window is still open for another few weeks. I know that there are members in this room that have applications.

If you are considering, maybe you've already started the application process, I would really encourage all of you to think closely and carefully and hard about what you can put on the table.

There is real money here for you to put programs together that have a likely outcome of growing the number of players, coaches and referees that we have in our organization. I don't know one person here that doesn't want to see our organization grow and Innovate to Grow and the funding that's there will help you do that, so $I$ would strongly encourage all of you to continue to look at what applications, what projects and proposals you might put on the table for that.

And the second thing $I$ wanted to talk about was or is, rather, a very unique
opportunity that we all have and we are going to be working collaboratively with you to stage for the first time a championship event that pits your Adult National Champion against the UEFA European Amateur Champion and that is a great opportunity for all of us.

It's a great opportunity to highlight the level of play and quality and commitment of amateur players from across the U.S. against amateur players in Europe, so $I$ would like to thank John and Richard, in particular, who have worked closely with Carlos Cordeiro and some of our staff to bring that to fruition, so congratulations.

We're really looking forward to working with you on that, so thank you.

## (Applause.)

MR. REMEDI: I probably should have opened with this. I'm addressing you on behalf of U.S. Soccer's President, Carlo Cordeiro who, as you know, was here and with us all last year in Buffalo. He asked me to express his regrets for not being here with
you today.
He is most certainly aware of all of the things that we have going on together and what your agenda looks like and he sends through me his best regards to all of you.

I want to close with just one more thing related to the summer that we've had as a federation on the field and $I$ want to acknowledge the great results that we had in France for the Women's World Cup.

## (Applause.)

MR. REMEDI: The U.S. Women's team obviously is a tremendous source of pride for all of us. I know it is for Caitlin and $I$ who go to work, as many of you do, everyday thinking about how to grow the sport and to have a team like that that has now won the World Cup four times, and to go along with the four Olympic gold medicals that it has, it's just a truly remarkable achievement and accomplishment and the results that we have had on the field are due in no small part to all of the members that we have across the
country and $I$ certainly mean that inclusive of everyone in this room, so this isn't an us or a we.

This is all of us should be very proud of our team, the great accomplishment they had in France and the bright future our Women's program has moving forward, so congratulations to all of us, to you and certainly to the 23 players and coaches that went on the field and did the job this summer, so congratulations to all of you and all of them.

And then, lastly, $I$ just want to acknowledge I'm really looking forward to being with you all tonight for your Hall of Fame induction ceremony. I certainly want to congratulate all of your incoming inductees, Richard to my right, Angelo, Alex and Wally.

I've been told by multiple people here that this is one of the finest classes to go into the USASA Hall of Fame, so I want to congratulate all of you and wish you all best for your meeting today.

Caitlin and $I$ aren't going anywhere, so
we're happy to engage one-on-one after the meeting or certainly this evening if there is anything more specific you want to talk to any or either of us about, so best of luck with your meeting and thank you very much.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you very much, Brian. Scott?

MR. EISENBRAUN: Okay. For general
business voting today we have 184 total votes possible. Half plus one is 93 and two-thirds is 123 votes.

For the election there is a possible 167 votes. Obviously, you have to have a majority to win, so there are your numbers, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you for the credentials. Motion to accept the credentials report?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: And second?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: So moved. Okay. So
good afternoon again, members of USASA. Once again, welcome to Palm Springs. It's always great to get together as a group to discuss soccer and to see how we can all grow the game together.

As many other organizations, including all your organizations out there, we all look for ways to continue to grow and better ourselves and what we can do better to grow our organizations. It's not an easy task. If we had that silver bullet we would have used it.

That doesn't mean we don't continue to look at ways of doing it. Your wonderful Directors, all sitting up here with myself, we work tirelessly looking at how we can better this game and how we can grow the game at the next level.

I hear the rumblings that we don't get things done, but $I$ will stand here before the National Council and say that is furthest from the truth. This Board, when we meet, we work tirelessly looking at ways of growing this game.

We held a strategy session a while ago and we all agreed that USASA needed to be proactive in working with state associations and all our members. We have concluded that in order to grow we must assist members who need our resources and the help from our National office.

We will be reorganizing our staff in Chicago and we will dedicate a person as a member service person at the office and that person will focus on working with every one of you to help you where you need the most help.

In addition, many of you saw yesterday Tom Moore's presentation on tools in a box or State Association in a Box. We put that together to put all the necessary tools in there that will help you run an effective organization.

This is a work in progress. It is not complete. It's only the beginning, but we have established the first steps and we will begin that process.

Last year $I$ heard the cry about the lack
of communication between us and the members. To try to fix that issue, $I$ have been sending all the members the meeting notes of all U.S. Soccer meetings and all our Board meetings, hopefully in a timely manner so that hopefully you are all being kept informed as to what is happening both at our level and at the Federation level.

There are still ways to improve the communication between us and the members and we will be also looking at ways to better do that. We are very close, very close in bringing back a Women's National Tournament which was one of the promises I made last year when $I$ ran for re-election.

We are looking at a kickoff of a new Women's Tournament in the Spring of 2020. We are finishing up the details of our committee and once we have all the details set, we will announce them to the membership.

This year with the partnership of U.S. Soccer, as Brian alluded to, together we will host the first ever UEFA/USASA Amateur Cup.

It will be held in May also, so we're going to have a busy May next year and USA will host the team called Dolny Slask from Poland.

They were the European UEFA amateur champion and they will be coming to the United States to play against Newtown Pride from Connecticut. This game will be a very high exposure event for USASA.

We are in the planning stages and are working closely with U.S. Soccer, Connecticut Adult Soccer and the Newtown Pride to ensure that this will be a highly successful event for USASA and U.S. Soccer.

This year we once again held some very successful events, beginning with the Steinbrecher Cup which was played at the Bavarian Club in Milwaukee. I again want to reiterate and say thank you and shout out to the Bavarian Club for putting on a first class event.

We want to congratulate the Michigan Bucks who won their third consecutive steinbrecher Championship. Being that they won three
championships, we have told them that we will host the event in Flint, Michigan next year as a reward for being a three-time champion, so the Steinbrecher cup next year will be held in Flint, Michigan.

The next event we held was Soccer Fest and it was brought back to Massachusetts. Again, with the hard work of our staff, the hard work of the team and players playing there, it was a very successful event. I want to thank Cezar and Andy White from Mass Soccer for hosting the great event for us once again.

The Amateur Cup was our next event which was hosted by the Illinois State Soccer Association. I want to thank Claudio, as Brian also did. Claudio did a -- I caught Cladio running his butt off at that tournament and they did a great job in hosting the event and the facility was a first class facility.

It was a new college that we had negotiated with which really gave the event a good exposure to the teams, the players and
the referees that the facility was a first class facility.

And again, $I$ want to congratulate the Newtown Pride for being crowned our National Amateur Champion.

Again, one of the buzzwords that we've all been hearing which would be challenging for a lot of us is safe Sport. Unfortunately, it's something that we have to deal with. There is no ifs, ands or butts. It's a federal law that was passed by Congress, so we all have to adhere by its mandates.

I know there are a lot of questions surrounding safe sport and we continue to work closely with U.S. Soccer to see how we can make it easier for our members to meet those requirements and to understand them better.

As I stated also at the Board meeting for those of you that were there, that our liability rates for our insurance have gone up for the second year in a row. The premiums this year for USASA are approximately an additional $\$ 65,000$ or $\$ 70,000$ on our budget.

It's a substantial increase, but $I$ can announce that because of the hard work of our Board and Paul who -- we established an insurance reserve fund a few years ago and because we have enough cash in that reserve fund, we will not need to raise our fees after our second increase to our insurance rates, so thanks to Paul and the Board for working on that so we can keep our fees at a reasonable rate with all of you so you don't have to go back to your members to increase their fees.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: I also want to mention again, as Brian did, and $I$ would reiterate what Brian said about the Innovate to Growth fund. I spoke to Brian yesterday and, as Brian said, there are people working on their application, but as of yesterday $I$ think there were 12 applications submitted and none came from USASA.

We can do better than that. I know there's not anyone in this room, including myself, that would say no if $I$ could get my
hands on some extra cash to do something nice with it, to grow our sport, so I plead with you think of some ideas.

I'm sure everyone in this room has ideas. Put it down on paper. Send it into the Federation because we had $\$ 6$ million available last few year. I think we used up \$1.8 million, so there's a lot of money being left on the table that you all can take advantage of, so let's do it, right?

Tonight we will recognize four great individuals for their contributions for the game of soccer. This year's class is a great group of individuals. I want to thank Mike Edwards and the Hall of Fame Committee for all their hard work and putting the program together and to get the nominations out there. They did a fantastic job.

And before $I$ conclude, $I$ also want to congratulate some of the newly-elected officials that were elected this morning at the Regional level. Bill George, congratulations and to John Kahmke, thank you
for your service as President of Region 1 .
I know an election is a tough, tough sport, but you have proven that you did the job well in your year in that position.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: I don't think there were any changes in Region 2 , so congratulations to all the returning elected officials. In Region 3 I'd like to congratulate Kali Blackshear for being the new Secretary.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: And she replaced Karon Beyer who as you all know has elevated to being Secretary of USASA, and for those that don't know Karon, Karon is not here with us because she underwent some difficult times in her life with a couple of major surgeries, and just keep her in your prayers.

She is one of us. She would have loved to have been here but, unfortunately, things cross in our lives that we're not anticipating and keep Karon in your prayers. We all need
all the help we can get.
And Region 4, $I$ want to congratulate Robin Runstein who replaces Paul Scherer as the Region 4 director.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: And also on Region 3 Otey. I'm sorry, otey. I don't have my glasses on, but Otey who is the new Deputy Director in Region 3. So congratulations.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: And also in Region 4 as Robin became the new Regional Director and left a vacancy in the Deputy Director's spot, I would like to congratulate Kendra Halterman as the new Deputy Director.
(Applause.)
UNIDENTIFIED PERSON: Is that the first
time two women are in power in the region?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Two women are running Region 4.
(Applause.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Guys, you know, better watch it. They're coming after us.

All right. So to conclude my speech, I also don't want to end my speech without making a comment about Zack, about Jen, Nick, Pierre who are always behind the scenes making sure the events get off without a hitch. They did a fantastic job throughout the whole weekend, so let's give them a round of applause.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: With that $I$ will end my speech. I want to thank everyone again from the bottom of my heart for being here. It's great being with a group of friends like you.

So without further ado, we will continue with the program. So $I$ will call on Duncan, our Executive Director, to give his report.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Can everybody hear me? I'm going to touch on some of the things John already spoke, so just bear with me.

As always, welcome. Hope you enjoyed the sunshine here. I have to say a big thank you
to Cal South State Association for providing the food at last night's events.

## (Applause.)

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Thank you. Much appreciated.

So I have a question for you. Raise your hands if you have been to more than five USASA AGMs or Mid Year Meetings. That's a lot of people. You can put them down. Looking around, $I$ would say it's some 90 percent of you in this room.

So my next question to you is this: Why are you here? Why do you keep coming back and what brings you back? What is it that brings you back? Think about that for a little while because sometimes that answer is not always immediately apparent.

Now, the reason $I$ start with that question is this: As you know, we had a Board retreat before Christmas and we started that retreat with a session that started with that question. Why does USASA exist and why are you involved?

That was the question to the Board. Now, as we said, that is not easy and, in fact, we wrestled with this question, all the staff and I, and we had to stop the debate eventually because it went on and on and we returned to it actually the next morning.

Now, everyone in the room was able to identify what we do and how we do it, but they couldn't get to the why. Those who came to Thomas's presentation yesterday, everybody knew what we do and how we do it. And the Board knew that, but they didn't know why they did that.

Now, in the end, one member of the Board, out of shear frustration, slammed his fist on the table and said, "I got in this game to meet $n i c e$ people and have a good time".

Bingo. Bingo. That started a ripple effect. Somebody then says, "I've been involved in this for 20 years because $I$ have made friends with people all over the country". Somebody else said, "I've stayed involved because $I$ love the camaraderie", and
it went on and on and on for a few minutes. So we finally got to our why. Why do we exist? We offer opportunities through soccer for people to have fun and develop lifelong friendships. It's a bit more detailed than the game of Life, right? It's a little bit more than that.

And this statement is so important because it should effect all of the decisions that we make regarding our competitions, our meetings, our IT systems. Anything and everything that we do should relate back to will this help us bring people together to have fun and make lifelong friendships.

The statement runs true throughout the organization, whether you're an administrator, a recreational player, a highly competitive player. Being part of something, to socialize, to make friends, meet up with old friends is vitally important and the root cause of why you are all in this room.

Now, we live in the age of social media. What is social media trying to do? Bring
people together, connect people, and on the surface that works, but it has a major flaw. It doesn't bring people together like this in person so we can't build deep and meaningful relationships with people if you can't see their eyes, you can't see their body language. There's no way you can experience life together.

I'll give you some examples. Think about last year we're in Niagara Falls. I was actually talking to Bill Bosgraaf just a couple weeks ago. Bill has great memories of last year. His folks from Utah took an extra excursion and he has these fond memories and $I$ think we all have these fond memories that relate to a soccer game or soccer meeting you went to somewhere.

You can't put a price on those experiences. That's why we're here. So what I'm trying to convey to you is the fact that soccer brings people together and it's far more important that the results on the field or winning a cup.

It can unite diverse groups and bring endless intrinsic benefits. If you don't believe me, but $I$ know some of you do, let's give some examples from our membership. So we're going to see a short video of an interview we did with a guy named Buddy.

Buddy played in the Men's Over 75 Division at this year's Soccer Fest, so let's hear what Buddy had to say.

## (Video playing.)

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Now, as you see the emotion welling up in Buddy, it brings to light what soccer means. It plays a vital part in people's lives. He didn't talk much about winning, but he did talk about being part of the league and that was a priority of his, to make it to the game on Sunday.

Now, winning does bring a whole new meaning, of course. We actually filmed Buddy on a Thursday and on Sunday his Over 75 team won the final and he was in tears again, this time tears of joy. A great example of what it means to our membership.

Now I'm going to show another video, so let's watch some highlights now from the 2019 National Amateur Cup Finals and then I'll read a statement from Matt Svanda who manages that winning team.

## (Video playing.)

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Let me tell you a little bit about this year. Let me read this quote from their manager, Matt Svanda. "Our team is an eclectic mix of players pulled from various ethnic and national backgrounds. We have young men from Jamaica, Ivory Coast, Gambia, Ireland and America, and they come to us looking for a home, a safe place where they can express themselves and feel valued.

This adventure, winning the Cup, is for many of them the best thing that has ever happened in their lives. They will never forget this or each other".

Those are powerful words from a guy who, with his father, runs this team on a shoestring budget. These players and coaches and managers should be the focus of what we do
and how we do it because they are the why we're here. That's why we're here. We're here for those people. And we do this to bring smiles to their faces and to provide them with memories that will last a lifetime and $I$ know many of you will agree with that statement.

I mentioned this team operates on a shoestring budget. So tight are the purse strings for that team, they couldn't actually afford to travel to the final in Chicago. However, the Connecticut State Association has always placed their players and teams at the center of their organization.

Dan and Jack stepped in and provided the necessary funds, the travel funds, and actually Jack traveled with the team and acted as their admin manager. It was an amazing gesture from the State Association.

## (Applause.)

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Without the State's help, that team would not now be national champions. That's how important it
is.
Now, I'm not saying that you have to spend all of your money on paying for team travel, but think about it as you go away from here, think about what you do to invest in your teams and your players and that is actually why we're here, to bring those people together.

Now, from a national perspective -- John's mentioned some of this already -- we've been making some adjustments over the past couple of years. Our attention has been focused on the player first because without them there is nothing to administer, officiate or support.

So for the 2019 Soccer Fest, we made it easier for the teams to register by including the player pass fee into the tournament entry fee. Now, many of the teams that participate in Soccer Fest are not regular teams. They are tournament teams.

By that $I$ mean they come together once a year to play Soccer Fest. For example, we have a men's team that comes out of

Philadelphia, but it's a mix of Philadelphia and Boston. They are old college buddies or business associates. We have a women's team that supplements its predominantly Hawaiian base with players in North California and Southern California and some other states. In fact, the leader of that team is in the room. Soccer Fest is a place where they reconnect with old friends. They develop new relationships and, as you heard Buddy talk about his love of the tournament, it gives many of these players a focus and a purpose because this year we ran a division for Men's Over 75 and Women's Over 70.

They take it so seriously. It's one of the biggest parts of their lives. They've already booked their hotel for next year.

Now, it's a tough job when you're a team captain or manager to get all of those players signed up and organized. It's over 2000 players that come to that venue, so we help them by having all of the players upload their personal details into our system.

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They click on the insurance waiver box and they are all registered. We're taking a huge headache taken away from those team managers.

In 2020 we're also going to be imparting our website, the Soccer Fest website that is, which will allow us to improve the opportunities for individual players to actually find teams to play at Soccer Fest. We want to be there to facilitate, actually helping people to connect.

Now, we saw action from the National Amateur Cup Final a few moments ago. We continue to improve the player experience year after year. In 2019, this year, we added field boards and a victory arch. We improved the whole locker room environment to make it a more professional experience for those amateur players.

Now, I spoke to some of those players that Matt Svanda referenced with his quote earlier and they did come from some tough backgrounds. Many of them only lived in America for a short period of time, but that experience for them
was one of the best things that's happened in their lives and they have this camaraderie and it was a beautiful thing to see.

Now, you heard Buddy also talk about driving from Long Island to Boston every Sunday to play in the Over the Hill League. Now, he had to drive through Connecticut to get there.

Newtown this year wanted to host the National Cup Final and we said no. Well, I don't want Dan and Jack to start thinking that we have something against the state of Connecticut. We don't. It's quite the opposite because in 2020 Connecticut will host the first ever match between the U.S. Amateur Champions and the UEFA Champions.

As John said, in partnership with U.S.
Soccer and UEFA, we will see Newtown Pride versus Dolny Slask from Poland.

This game takes us back to our why. Why are we here, and also why soccer can play such an important role for bringing not just people together, but also help to heal wounds and
build bridges. The game will be played close to the Sandy Hook school who suffered at the hands of a reckless shooter.

We pray that the game will be a conduit uniting the community so they can celebrate, not commiserate.

On the theme of uniting, $I$ also want to introduce the concept for a new Premier Over 40's Competition, a model that we need to discuss, but it could work across the various forums that we do.

We currently have an Over 40 Men's Division within the Adult Soccer Fest. Under the original tournament documents, they are categorized as the Over 40 National Champions.

The Regions have been organizing a competition for Over 40 where their winners characterize themselves as National Champions. Now, this is causing some confusion in the marketplace and prevents the most competitive teams from playing against each other.

So the following concept for you to start thinking about next time you get together is
this: We want to get the best Over 40 teams into one competition and this concept will combine the elements of direct entry and knockout competition.

So the competition format will be this. Eight teams to compete in a Premier Division within Adult Soccer Fest. The eight teams will be divided into two groups of four teams decided by a draw.

The teams will play three group matches Thursday, Friday and Saturday evening with the two group winners playing the final on Sunday. Competition will be based on a three point system. For those of you who are not aware, in Soccer Fest we use a competitive ten point system. This will be FIFA three point system because it's a competitive competition.

Now, the eight teams to be selected to compete next year, 2020, will be those outlined on the chart. It will be the Region 1 Champions, the Region 2 Champions, the Region 3 Champions. Region 4 didn't have a champion, so we would ask that Cal South would
put a select team in and then we will invite the four teams that are in the semifinals in this year's Adult Soccer Fest from that region into that group. All right. And then you will get a champion in that Premier League group.

Now, in 2021 the format and selection will be exactly the same, only the fourth placed direct entry team, the traditional Soccer Fest team, will actually be relegated to go into the Division 1 because we will have another division within the Adult Soccer Fest.

The team that won the Division 1 title will be promoted into the eight team Premier Division. And if any region doesn't actually enter a team, then an extra spot will be open to the Region in which the Adult Soccer Fest takes place that year.

The four regions will always get four slots as the prior team and then we'll fill the other four spots at the Soccer Fest.

Now, this format allows the regions to run their own competitions, but provides a higher
level for the winning team to aspire to something while simultaneously provides competition amongst the traditional Soccer Fest teams as it includes promotion and relegation.

So that's something we need for the regions to go back and think about whether that will work for their team.

2020 will also see us re-launch the women's competition. It will be played in May 2020. Remember, this first year will be a transition year where we're also trying to build out and strengthen regional competition.

Now, our focus is not just the national competitions. Following the Strategic

Meetings held in a mix of States who were chosen by the Regional Directors, we were able to compile a list of common issues and needs from you and it's clear that many state associations need help in meeting minimum requirements before they even consider expanding their services.

To that end, we have started a process of

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producing these generic documents that will help States with their player registrations, accounting and organizing hearings.

Tom Moore stepped up to assist in this process and many of you saw him present yesterday. The feedback on that was amazing. Tom, thank you.

But, Tom is like you. He's a volunteer, so as John said, starting in January we're going to be realigning Jen's duties. She will be taking on a new title of Member Services Manager and she will be your main point of contact and her focus will be on assisting all of the members of the organizations with administrative issues, ensuring submission of player registrations, data, insurance claims are all done in a timely and accurate manner.

She will be setting up monthly calls with each of you where you can discuss issues, share ideas and, more importantly, finding solutions.

We also hope to appoint, if you approve the budget, an Events Operation Director whose
focus will be on improving national events and increasing revenue generating opportunities within there.

Adult Soccer continues to grow in America and we need to adjust how and what we do to remain at the center of the game.

I started talking about developing lifelong friendships and $I$ will finish with this: The fun pickup games we played yesterday and tonight we get to celebrate with old friends as we induct our new members into the Hall of Fame, but on a somber note, we also lost a dear friend this year, Ken Conselyea, and Sal Rapaglia couldn't attend having suffered a nasty fall and we wish a full recovery and hope to see him in Nashville.

We are in this game together and we are here to help you. If you have a concern or an issue, if $I$ hear something $I$ am here. My phone remains very silent in my office. I am here. If you have a problem, call me.

Hopefully we don't have to call Jen as we

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go forward, but we are here to help. We are in this together. Thank you.

## (Applause.)

MS. BEVAN: Can $I$ have an opportunity to ask some questions?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Any speaker that comes up, please announce who you are and where you're from.

MS. BEVAN: Marti Bevan, Metro D.C./ Virginia Soccer Association. I want to make sure I understood you correctly. This year is the first year that you have players registered directly with you all for the U.S. Soccer Fest?

MR. RIDDLE: No. It's been for three years, but this year we have built it into the onefee.

MS. BEVAN: Right. I recall in the past that state associations were involved in helping verify player registration status and verify the roster and this year we were not, so I was wanting to understand how you were verifying if the player was registered or did

I hear you say that you just went ahead and charged everybody the $\$ 5$ turn-in capacity?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: We charged the entrance fee of $\$ 650$. We built in a margin for tournament player passes. As they were registering they have to put in an ID so the ones for a player pass put their ID and the other ones, instead of making them buy a separate pass into a separate system which takes a lot of time, they just put in their driver's license so they are registered.

MS. BEVAN: But how did you verify that they were already a registered player at the state association or whether they are a guest player and needed to pay into the tournament?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Because they have to put in their player pass or their driver license ID.

MS. BEVAN: The player pass that the state issues?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Yes.
MS. BEVAN: But that could be old and expired. So how are you verifying?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Well, when you take a picture of it it has the face on it.

MS. BEVAN: When all this occurred how many new players would you say were brought in as a result of this?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Anywhere between 600 and 700 .

MS. BEVAN: Okay. And were those players then allocated back from the state association in their counts or how were those players allocated for structure and stuff like that?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: They haven't been going back to the states.

MS. BEVAN: Because normally they would. If they came through me and I have to process it as a guest player and $I$ state them to be in my count, right?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: SO 654 divided by 54, it's about 12 players per state. You win.

MS. BEVAN: I'm just seeking
clarification. No judgment here. I'm just trying to understand since the process has changed and nothing was ever really communicated to us how this was all going down. We really had no communication at all, so we didn't know which players from our state were participating, so $I$ do feel like we need to at least understand where our players are going.

Some state associations we actually provide some subsidy for our players to travel, so we had no knowledge of rosters or anything that was going on, so $I$ think we do need to get that two-way communication back. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Okay. PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Thank you. So now that will take us into the elections of Officers. So first on the docket would be the office of Vice President of U.S. Adult Soccer. Any nominations for Vice President?

MR. HALL: Larry Hall, North Texas
Soccer. I'd like to place a nomination of Richard Moeller from the wonderful State of

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Florida in Region 3. I've known Richard for many years. He is a wonderful person.

For folks that don't know, he is very bilingual which is part of the magic when he stands up and goes in front of you, but he works tirelessly. He is one of those that not only walks the walk, but talks the talk.

I guess that's backwards, but he actually works very hard for us not only here, but on a Federation level and we'd like to place a nomination for him as Vice President of USASA.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Any other nominations for Vice President of U.S. Adult Soccer? Seeing none, $I$ will declare Richard the winner by acclamation. Congratulations.
(Applause.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Next we will have the Office of Treasurer of U.S. Adult Soccer. Any nominations for Treasurer?

MS. RICHARDSON: Karissa Richardson, Minnesota Soccer Association. All of you know Lori Stoneburner has served as our treasurer for the last several years. During the time
she's been on the Board as Treasurer, she's worked hard to ensure the ongoing successes of the organization by handling all of the accounting needs that we have.

She's knowledgeable, she's skilled, she's dedicated and $I$ have utmost confidence in her ongoing commitment to this organization and I'm proud to nominate her for USASA Treasurer.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you, Karissa. Any other nominations for Treasurer? There being none, congratulations Lori. By affirmation, you are now the Treasurer.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: So next we will go on to the At-Large position. And any nominations for At-Large? Mike Edwards.

MR. EDWARDS: Mike Edwards, Past President, and Chairman of the USASA Fashion Committee.

## (Laughter.)

MR. EDWARDS: From the time $I$ have been here since $I$ had connective tissue and brown hair, we've had some successful events like
the ' 94 World Cup, the ' 99 World Cup. I just have the sensation that we should feel especially successful and it just seems like for all the successes our sport has engaged in, we just seem to be cut and stalled these days with membership organizations.

It's really frustrating and $I$ say that as my introduction to nominate my friend, Werner Fricker, to be retained on the Board of USASA. We've gotten some explosive growth in the sport of people watching it, of people buying shirts for teams that they have no idea what city they are in in Europe, but $I$ can't seem to get them to come out and actually play soccer and $I$ know a lot of you feel the same way.

I nominate my friend Werner to stay in this position because he's been involved in helping run a team, the United German Bavarians. His club has hosted our championship since the 1980 s. First time $I$ saw a Youth Cup was at the UGH in 1988 and the AGM.

He's been involved with the leagues in Pennsylvania with the State Associations in the region. He served in positions with U.S. Soccer, as I have, over our time. He's created thoughtful value. He understands the breadth of the sport and has a clear understanding of the shortcomings we're trying to deal with and $I$ would encourage you to retain him in his position on the Board with USASA.

I think his contribution will continue to be known.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you, Mike.
MS. RICHARDSON: Again, Karissa Richardson, Minnesota Soccer Association. I'm here today to nominate Chaz Ballish for position of the At-Large member. Chaz has served the last two and a half years as Deputy Director of Region 3 and throughout that time he volunteered to help with the tournaments throughout his region, made himself available to support the states, including working with Alabama to rewrite bylaws.

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He is also currently on the Rules Committee for USASA. He's previously been on the Governance and the Appeals Committee and currently sits on the U.S. Soccer Federation Appeals Committee.

Chaz is an attorney with a lot of experience in business organization and associations, a skill that would support this organization and serve the Board. He currently plays actively with the Charleston Masters League, which he also runs, and based on his professional experience, his playing experience, $I$ believe he offers to the sport a unique perspective. I'm proud to nominate him.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you, Karissa. Claudio?

MR. FRIGO: Claudio Frigo, Illinois State Soccer Association President. I would like to nominate Paul Scherer for the At-Large position. For last year Paul and $I$ have become pretty good friends and I realize that we have a lot of similar thoughts and
interests with how the game should be run.
I think that we need to give him a chance to continue to be on the Board to give the rest of the Board a nice crosscheck of what we need to be doing. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you, Claudio. Any other nominations for the At-Large position of U.S. Adult Soccer? Being none, nominations are now closed and $I$ will turn it over to -- if you look up on the screen -- did you want to speak?

Okay. I'll give you the opportunity for anyone if they would like to speak. I'll start with Chaz.

MR. BALLISH: Good morning. I live in Charleston, South Carolina and $I$ would very much like to ask everyone here for their vote today. I'm a player. I've played in the Charleston Masters League, one of the greatest leagues with over 30 or over 50 old guys who like to drink beer.

I have run that league. I can't run it by myself. We have a great Board of Directors
and an overall great group of guys playing, actively involved in running leagues for a long time. As Karissa said, I'm also an attorney and this is kind of what $I$ do.

I do want to take one second. I talked to everybody in the regions and $I$ forgot in two regions to say something and $I$ just want to say it now. As John said, Karon Beyer, our Secretary, she is battling cancer. I have spoken to her and she is okay with me bringing this up today and everybody knowing what she's going through.

She's had two major surgeries and she could use your love, so shoot her a quick email. Everyone don't do it today, but please sometime over the next couple of months, she could really just use an email saying hey, I love you, $I$ 'm thinking about you, can't wait to have you back.

As Duncan said, we do this because we make great friends. Karon is a great friend to all of us, so please reach out to her over the next couple of months, send her a quick note,

I'm praying for you.
So again, back to this whole thing. I very much want to be a part of the Board and I want to be a part of the Board because I believe I offer new perspective. I'm the grand underdog here. I never sat on the U.S. Soccer Board of Directors. I don't have 20 years experience up here, but I still play. I still play every single week in and out and those are our constituents, the players. That's why we do this is for the players and I have been here long enough to see a pattern, a pattern of things that we need to do and those things aren't always completely accomplished.

Sometimes we come back to the same thing on our list. Maybe a new perspective, some fresh ideas, it might be time to get some new blood in there and that's why I put my name forward and $I$ stand behind it and $I$ appreciate all of you who've come up here and asked me to run, inspired me to run and who have supported me in this.

I wouldn't be sad if I lose because I'm

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running against two legends within USASA who either one would be a great choice, but I would like the opportunity. So thank you very much for your time.
(Applause.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you, Chaz.
Paul?
MR. SCHERER: I have already asked you for your vote. I hope that everybody knows that I'm dedicated. I'll be there for you. You can email me, call me. All my information is available. I am ready to help you. Thank you.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you, Paul. So now nominations are closed. You've heard the speeches. Voting is now open and there are the directions. If anybody needs any assistance, let us know and we have Nick here who will assist you in getting the voting done, so it is now open.

If nobody gets a 50 percent on one vote we would have to go to a second ballot, so just

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## (Votes being cast.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Everybody please have a seat. Okay. We do not have a majority winner, so we'll need to go to a second ballot. First ballot, Werner Fricker with 39 percent of the votes, Chaz Ballish with 38 percent of the vote and Paul Scherer with 23 percent of the vote. So we need to go on with a second ballot.

The same three nominees are eligible again unless any of them would like to drop out, so we're voting on the same three nominees, unless anybody withdraws.

You cannot vote yet. The voting will open in approximately five minutes. I guess it has to reboot the system.
(Brief recess.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Voting is now open, so place your votes.
(Votes being cast.)
MR. FALCONE: Do not click Member At-Large. That was the first ballot. There's
another thing for ballot two.
(Votes being cast.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Can $I$ have everyone's attention. The vote tally came in. Out of a total of 167 votes, we have Chaz Ballish with 44 percent, Werner Fricker with 40 percent and Paul Scherer with 16 percent.

So we need to do a third ballot. Do you need five minutes to reboot? So we have to wait five minutes again.

Paul Scherer?

MR. SCHERER: Obviously, my percent is going down. It doesn't make much sense for me to continue to run. I certainly appreciate all of you that have supported me and voted for me. At this point $\quad$ will go ahead and ask you to go ahead and support Chaz and see how that comes out. Thank you.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Begin voting again. (Votes being cast.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Can I have everyone's attention. Please have a seat. Following the
third ballot, I'd like to congratulate Chaz Ballish with out of 167 votes he got 58 percent of the vote. Congratulations.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Now we have one final election that $I$ would like you to basically ratify. The Board of Directors had their meeting yesterday. Our Independent Director's seat is up for re-election, which when we elected Brett we said at the AGM 2019 it would be up for re-election, so it's technically a year and a half. He's been elected for a year and a half.

So the Board has or will put up a nomination for the re-election of Brett as Independent Director. All those in favor say aye. Anybody opposed?

Congratulations, Brett.
(Applause.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Now that we're done with the elections, next we have Unfinished Business.

At this time $I$ would like the Council to
ratify the actions of the Board for the last year or since our last AGM.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Second?
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: All those in favor say
aye. Anybody opposed? Thank you.
(Motion passed.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Next on the agenda I would also like the National Council to ratify all of the National Leagues that we have voted in as provisional members which is the UPSL, NPSL. We all changed them over to USASA leagues from National and Regional leagues, so we would like you to ratify that these teams now will be a full member under those guidelines.

Okay. So can I get a motion to approve? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Approved.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Second?
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Any discussion? All
those in favor? Aye. Anybody opposed? Thank

## (Motion passed.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Next we'll go on to New Business. And $I$ would like to call up Lori. Not Lori. I'm sorry. Bill George who is the Budget Chairman to come up and do the budget with the National Council.

MR. GEORGE: Good afternoon, everyone. Bill George on behalf of the Budget Committee for us to approve the budget, which you'll find on Pages 12 and 13 of your Book.

We're actually going to do two things. We have to make an amendment first and once we approve that amendment, which we will share with you shortly, then we will look to approve the budget.

The amendment relates to Row 29 which I think John and Duncan spoke to these. We have just gotten recent information on the updating of the increase in insurance, so to reflect this change that's resulting in a -- and Lori correct me if I'm wrong -- an increase of $\$ 63,896$ which would effectively be added to

Row 29 which would give us a new, if my math is correct, $\$ 1,990,387$ total, so do $I$ have a motion to approve that amendment?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Moved.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
MR. GEORGE: All in favor? Aye. So moved.

Now we will move on to the budget and with the new amendment now -- first we'll go the motion to approve. Is there a motion to approve?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
MR. GEORGE: Any discussion? Please identify yourself.

MS. CAMPBELL: I'm Janet Campbell with North Texas Soccer and $I$ had a couple of questions on budget. I was actually reviewing it a little bit with Lori and ran out of time here, but so just to start with, I'm trying to understand.
I'm actually a little new to this.

Line 16, why do we have $\$ 38,000$ in income from

USASA league team fees in the past and we have none in the budget for this year, this next year?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: We got rid of team fees but upped the player registration fees.

MS. CAMPBELL: I'm not seeing any place else in the player registration to account for that. Has it been added somewhere else?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: It's included in that line and there's a line further down which equates for the $\$ 3$ per player, if I'm right.

MS. CAMPBELL: Okay. And then I had a question on Line 32 why we have the $\$ 39,000$ in expenses that we did not have in the past and Lori was telling me that it was something that was coming in above and then we are refunding it to them; is that correct? Is that what you were saying?

MS. STONEBURNER: We're giving back to States, \$3 a player.

MS. CAMPBELL: Then something came up in
our regional meeting. We were asking about the Women's Cup that is budgeted at $\$ 30,000$ and as to whether or not that is actually something that is under planning because someone on the Women's Committee told us that they have not done anything with that and we want to make sure that there's actually something that's planned to happen there with that money.

MR. GEORGE: I think what John and Duncan discussed is the $\$ 30,000$ has been earmarked. There are two competitions planned for 2020 in May and in August. Now, of course, there would be some recommendations coming from the Women's Committee in terms of how it will be executed, but that $\$ 30,000$ has been earmarked for that.

MS. CAMPBELL: Then on the -- there's a line item called State Support, Line 49, that is $\$ 20,000$. What is that? Is that something we're going to get?

MR. GEORGE: Correct. My understanding, and Duncan and John, feel free to chime in,

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but coming out of the strategic sessions that took place earlier this year, $\$ 20,000$ was recommended by the Board to earmark for a variety of state support issues.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: That's per state, right?

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: That goes along with what $I$ said earlier about the member services, so as we find out where there's issues where some states are struggling, maybe we can use some of that money for whatever is needed to help that state to complete its task.

MS. CAMPBELL: So it's not some kind of grant program or just in general for --

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: This is so when there's a need, at least there's money there to actually cure that problem.

MS. CAMPBELL: Okay. And then $I$ was wondering on Line 61 that is Staff Travel and Transportation, it's almost in half, but $I$ understand you're hiring another person, so I'm just trying to figure out how you're going
to be able to cut your travel in half.
MR. GEORGE: I don't know if Duncan may
want to speak to this. It was recommended from the National office that they anticipated an ability to reduce travel expenses.

MS. CAMPBELL: So you feel confident you'll be able to stick to that then?

MR. GEORGE: If they didn't feel
confident they would not have recommended that reduction.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: In today's technology world we can make that change because we can use various other forms of communication. One of the other things we're going to do is the last few years we've traditionally gone to the Coach's Convention in January where we have a booth.

It's not really the audience for us. We always send three staff. It's a lot of expense, so there's a huge savings there.

MS. CAMPBELL: So you've identified some things. And then $I$ believe it's the next to last question here is Line 68, Legal Expenses.

Why are legal expenses --
MR. GEORGE: A few things. It was the committee and collaboration with Lori and we thought it was prudent to put a larger amount than had currently been budgeted. With Safe Sport there have been some specific tangible items that we anticipate spending on, whether it's reaching out to an outside counsel law firm that has experience with the Amateur Athlete Safe Sport to get some advisory opinions of best practices, so there are some discreet tangible expenditures that are expected this year and as has been discussed in some prior budget conversations and prior AGMs, it was felt that the $\$ 5000$ we previously had put in that spot was just simply too low. MS. CAMPBELL: Well, $I$ see this year so far we've only reached $\$ 6000$, so that seemed to be exorbitant.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR RIDDLE: Obviously, the Safe Sport issue we're going to have to get some legal counsel and everybody will agree in the room it's going to be a huge
problem for us. It's already a problem that the insurance has already gone up, so there will be some expense over the next budget year that starts in January.

The other one is, for those that came to the presentation with Tom yesterday, we need to have our own bylaws actually looked at by a legal counsel in Illinois, which we changed from Tennessee to Illinois three years ago and we didn't actully get that done, so that's just a thing we need to do which we've never done before, so there will be some extra legal expenses.

MR. GEORGE: These are some tangible legal expenses that we are anticipating. To address the revisions to bylaws we have to engage counsel and to get some best practice guidance, and if anyone has engaged a lawyer, just getting a will is going to cost \$5000.

We have to put it in place. It doesn't necessarily mean we'll spend all $\$ 37,000$, but these were some discreet items that we felt was necessary to allocate money for.

MS. CAMPBELL: I understand. With what you're telling us about the change in that one line item, so we're now going to be at $\$ 200,000$ in the hole; is that right?

MR. GEORGE: Approximately $\$ 193,000$, which is -- again, this is a budget of about \$3. 6 million so --

MS. CAMPBELL: Okay, but we're going to be -- where does that put us if we're $\$ 200,000$ in the hole with the other significant amounts?

MR. GEORGE: We have a substantial amount of reserves. It doesn't mean we're going to spend all of it. I should point out, from 2016 to 2018 we've actually operated in the black and utilized our budget anywhere from 92 percent to 95 percent, so I think that should be reassuring that we were diligent in trying to anticipate expenses, but there's a likelihood, given past practices, that we probably won't meet or exceed.

MS. CAMPBELL: And $I$ just want to make one suggestion, being relatively new to this.

I didn't really want to bring this up in front of this whole group. It might be good if -rather than spend the time in this meeting, it might be good in the future if maybe prior to this session you have just a question and answer session on the budget so we don't need to do that.

MR. GEORGE: A year ago I think we did that.

MR. CALLOWAY: Lance Calloway from Washington state. One thing that can easily simplify this is a statement of the financials of the budget and the explanation of it. If you did that, put that in writing, made it transparent and provide a balance sheet so we know how much money is in reserves because we are looking at - I know you said it was sent out, but $I$ as a member did not receive it, so we have a book here and there's a lot of other stuff in here, we can easily take one more page, insert it in there and it's clear and it gives you guys a far better level of transparency.

MR. GEORGE: Thank you for the suggestion.

Without seeing anyone else at the microphone, do we have with a motion to approve the budget?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.

MR. GEORGE: All in favor say aye. Any
opposed? And thank you, all.
(Budget approved.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Karissa, please step up to the microphone and we will do Bylaw amendments.

MS. RICHARDSON: We have four Bylaw proposals. Mr. Scherer has withdrawn his two, the one with regard to the voting strength and the one with the change to the committee language. Paul Scherer and Dan Trainor are going to work on a new proposal for our next meeting with regard to the Committee and there will be some additional future discussions about voting strength as well, depending on what happens today.

So we're going to start first with Bylaw 107. As a reminder, I need a motion to consider the Bylaw amendment and a second and then we'll have discussion.

On 107 which is the Definitions section, this came from the Rules Committee itself. They would like to add one piece of language in there. Mr. Trainor pointed out to us that we don't have a definition in there of the USASA League, so they would like to at Number 15 add this language: USASA League, a league classified as a USASA League under Bylaw 202, Section 2 .

So, may $I$ have a motion to consider Bylaw $107 ?$

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved.

MS. RICHARDSON: Second?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.

MS. RICHARDSON: Any discussion? All in
favor of the proposed provision to Bylaw 107 please say aye. Any opposed? All right.

## (Motion passed.)

MS. RICHARDSON: The second proposal from

Jim Sadowski with Metro D.C. with regard to changes to Bylaw 302, Section 1, on the voting strength. Do I have a motion to consider? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved. MS. RICHARDSON: Do I have a second? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.

MS. RICHARDSON: Any discussion? Mr. Sadowski?

MR. SADOWSKI: Jim Sadowski, Metro D.C./Virginia. Without objection, I'd like to remove the language consistent with the Rules Committee's what I'll call recommendations about the first Bonus Votes category, as discussed at the Regional Meeting as well, so the language "A State Association or USASA affiliate" all the way to "additional vote", I'd like to remove that without objection.

MS. RICHARDSON: I believe because it is his proposal, we don't need to vote on his proposed amendment. Any further discussion on the proposal?

MR. SADOWSKI: I'm not going to say a lot because we talked a lot at the Regional
meetings and $I$ thank the Regional Directors and we had a lot of good questions. One of them was how would this effect me later and what would the voting strength look like?

So I did just now calculated what it would look like if my proposal passes, and the total number of votes -- this does not include the Board of Directors -- would be 418. Even if one were to carry two regions, we still would not have a majority.

North Texas would be the largest vote counter. They would have 23 and that's only 5.5 percent of the total vote for North Texas, even though North Texas is contributing to the organization 8 percent of the players.

If you took the top 11 state associations, and these are not in order, but Washington, North Texas, Mass, D.C./Virginia, Florida, Illinois, Cal North, North Carolina, Eastern New York, Texas South, Cal South, you will still have only 152 total votes, so even if somebody is a candidate or a proponent, we'd need nearly all 11 votes of the organizations.

They are still not there, so $I$ say that because there was some concern, rightfully so, that the smaller state associations would be jipped. They wouldn't have a voice. They wouldn't have a vote.

To the contrary, they've still got to get the smaller state associations and more importantly, the middle state association -not more importantly, but also those associations would benefit greatly by this proposal, so $I$ don't think this is a big win for the big states for those reasons.

And then lastly, there was a valid concern expressed at our regional meeting that this was radical. I wouldn't say that word is valid, but the small state vote would be diluted.

No matter how you vote on this proposal, I think it would be helpful to stop thinking about everything in terms of the me and rather the us. So if you change your perspective, you ask yourself three questions. Is this proposal better than what we have? I think
the answer is yes.
Does this proposal reward and encourage growth? I think the answer to that is yes. Will this help the organization? I think the answer to that is yes.

So if you change your perspective and come a little bit out of the, gosh, how will I benefit from this, $I$ think it would be helpful to think about my perspective not only on this proposal, but everything that we have up here for the vote. Is it going to help the organization grow and is it going to be rewarding and if you think about that in a little different perspective I think you'll vote yes on this. Thank you.

MR. CATALDI: Dan Cataldi from Iowa and,
Jim, I appreciate the idea. I think this is just not well thought out. In fact, I don't think there's been enough care and enough planning on it yet.

The fact that $I$ asked how many total number of votes, there wasn't even an understanding of that. It just shows there's

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not a true understanding of the magnitude of making these changes at this point. The fact is it will more than double the number of delegates and it grossly favors the larger states.

Not that the current system is right. To your question is this better? I would argue probably not. Are we in the right spot right now? Maybe not, but we need to think about it differently.

You mentioned the top 11 states. I'll look at it this way: The top five states, plus U.S. Club control nearly 25 percent of the votes. That's a pretty significant portion from a pretty small group of people.

Admittedly, they provide the most players, most funding, we get that, but from the vast majority of small states $I$ think if you do the math, and $I$ have done it, 10 of 12 states saw a decrease in their representation of the full Council.

I think there needs to be made some revisions, but $I$ think we need to more
thoroughly think through this large gap of no caps of 24 votes. I mean, we're going to need to invest in more red tape just for the votes. So I think there needs to be more care in counting the number of delegates. We need to have a better idea. Not that there shouldn't be changes, but we really need a plan than it more well thought out than just coming in without even knowing the total number of votes that are being represented. Thank you.

MR. BORTS: Good afternoon. Dave Borts, State of Rhode Island. I'll work a little backwards here. I'll take Jim Sadowski talking about us first and then work back to the proposal.

There are a number of reasons why smaller states in this organization have suffered over the years and it's because of the lack of us. Just to give a prime example, the larger states in this organization, most of them have access to large international soccer venues and they are in receipt of receipts from those games which are not shared with the smaller
states.

So talking about us, there's lot of us to talk about, first of all. Just as an example, my own state, we actually happen to be nine and a half miles from Foxboro stadium, but we don't get any revenues. The state of Massachusetts gets them from international.

So talking about this proposal, it really doesn't analyze the fact that larger organizations actually have greater resources, so I'm sure they do a great job in D.C. and Virginia and I applaud Jim. Jim is a good administrator, but they also generate that revenue and they are able to reinvest it, so the smaller states with the smaller populations don't have the revenues.

The lower their vote percentage becomes, the less influence they have in this organization and $I$ think really we should reward success, but success isn't where you're born, your jurisdiction. Your success is how you improve, so we should be rewarding anybody in those states that are growing in an
efficient way. Reward efficiency.
So whether that is vote totals or in grants or sharing, as $I$ say, of the resources that come into this organization in a more efficient way, I think that's a better way of going about rewarding what we all should be doing which is improving. Thank you.

## (Applause.)

MR. FALCONE: Tony Falcone, Region 1 Director. I speak against the proposal. Looking at the numbers, $I$ think we need the current voting structure that we have now and making the changes, it's very easily three of the four regions where anywhere from three to four state associations would have complete control of the voting power.

That means a few states can control what goes on in each region. I haven't really looked at it at the National level, but that would be a concern as well where power would be for a few.

I don't think the current system is wrong. There's a good reason why there's a cap.

There's a good reason why the numbers are limited so that you can't have a strength of power with just a few people. It helps get everyone to have an opportunity to have a voice in this organization.

The other thing is $I$ personally want to see growth in my state. Having an extra vote is not an incentive for that. I want growth because I like to get more participants in my state playing soccer and $I$ don't think there's too many who are here who are worried about adding more votes as an incentive for them to grow. Thank you.

MR. BUSH: Thank you, Tony. Tim Bush from Washington State. Couple observations. The reason in part that North Texas has six votes is that was my proposal 18 years ago because of their size. And clearly, the range of what we have to do as an organization eventually is decide what's in the best interest of the organization, not in the best interest of us individually.

I think under Jim's proposal, and $I$ very
much appreciate Jim's work on this, there's a hell of a lot of difference between 3200 players and 8500 players and that's the range for four votes. It's not reasonable. It really is unreasonable.

So, if we continue to worry about it, I don't think it's going to pass and it's not because we all have self-interests and we have nothing else and I'm not being critical of that. We have to do something with the voting strength and we also have to do something that is for the good of the game, not for our turf.

And finally, on the international games money, if you guys want to put the bigger states out of business, just keep battling about it and the Federation will take the money away and it will all be done because if you think because we're a bigger state we have all the resources in the world, we struggle like hell to stay in business.

So there's nothing easy about all this, but we need to talk about growth and we need to reward that and this was probably an

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imperfect way to try to deal with it, but Jim cares about it. We have to do better. We have to fix it and we have to stop talking about and it and reject it because it's all about me.

I can get 14 votes. I don't know what that will do for me. I don't want to rule the world. I don't want to run the organization, but we have to address that and we don't ever do it.

## (Applause.)

MR. BALLISH: Chaz Ballish, Region 3 Deputy Director. As a member of the Rules Committee, $I$ would like to ask if this doesn't pass -- there's been some negative comments about it -- but if it doesn't pass, the Rules Committee has discussed this and we believe it to be a good idea for John to create an ad hoc committee so if this doesn't pass to put it into -- because clearly not everyone is happy with voting structure as it exists right now and this may or may not be the answer.

We'll see if it passes, but if it doesn't
we would ask John to create an ad hoc committee and putting some of the people who spent a lot of time with Jim on this to brainstorm about re-approaching it and come back with something.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: If I may, I request we use the cards when we vote on this, please.

MS. RICHARDSON: Sure. Any further discussion?

MR. DAVEY: Bill Davey, Director of Region 2. I have just one quick question for Jim, and another comment. So when and in what criteria would we begin using this if it gets passed based on what we do at with the U.S. Soccer voting strength now?

MR. SADOWSKI: It would not take effect until the end of this calendar year, so we recount registration and then we get it back at our next meeting. That would be my understanding.

MR. DAVEY: The only concern $\quad$ have, quite honestly, and $I$ think we need to do
something to reward growth, participation and we need to figure that out and $I$ agree with Chaz about getting an ad hoc committee and I thank you, Jim, for bringing this up, but at this point in time with the stuff that we do in the office, I'm not so sure that we need to place the burden of tracking all this in the office at the current time. That's my other comment.

MS. RICHARDSON: Seeing no other discussion, if you are in support of adopting this proposal, please hold up your green card and if you're opposed please hold up your red card.

## (Voting cards held up.)

MS. RICHARDSON: It appears that the amendment -- the Bylaw provision will not be adopted. Thank you, guys, for your help and we'll see you next time.
(Applause.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. I read the recommendations and when we appoint new committees and I will take Chaz's
recommendation and we will put on an ad hoc committee to look into this, so that will happen.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So when you ask for that ad hoc committee, will you be offering for anybody who wants to participate to do that or is that anticipating you all--

PRESIDENT MOTTA: I would say this: If you're interested in serving, notify your Regional Director and then when we have a discussion on committees they will bring it up then.

Is there any other New Business? This is not Good of the Game, not yet.

MS. CAMPBELL: I have one other question. Janet Campbell from North Texas again on the budget. I know it's passed and it's on its way and we're good, but my question is we're showing player registration going at four and a half percent next year on standard players. Has our player registration been going up?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Well, it fluctuates.

It goes up, it goes down, it goes up, it goes down.

MS. CAMPBELL: I thought it had recently been going down. I just wanted to find out if we were basing a budget on an inflated player registration number. That was my only question.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you. Tom?
MR. MOORE: So for those state associations now using the Digital Learning Center for the recertification and new registration of referees, in order to obtain your referee registration you are required now to sign away all rights to your images for the current and future to the Federation. No further permission is required for them to make images of you as referee and to use the power they so chose, as I understand the language in this waiver.

I would urge the Board to strongly convey a message to the Federation that they really need to completely strike that language or at least substantially modify it. When I asked
the Referee Association yesterday why that language was in there, as far as I can tell what they said was, well, we're not really going to be taking any images of most of our referees. We promise not to use that stuff, but we may be using images from say development academy and in the past when we have done that we've had to actually go out and get permission from those referees and that's a burden on us, so we're just going to make all referees sign away all their rights in this regard.

I would urge opposition to that and certainly encourage you to ask the National Council here today if they would also like to see that language opposed.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Would you like to get a temperature of the room?

MR. MOORE: Sure.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: So you heard what Tom said. The Federation is now asking for signatures to waive their rights on using their images. Is it a concern of this body
that we would go back to U.S. Soccer and ask them to reconsider?

All those in favor say yes. Yes. Anybody opposed? Okay. Well, Brian Remedi, can I have your attention?
(Laughter.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: We just got a
unanimous response from this body that they would like the Federation to reconsider the use of images of referees, that they sign a waiver that the Federation has a right to their images and that's all referees.

They are asking the Federation to reconsider that and not ask for all referees to sign that waiver.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Okay.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. I went to the Federation.
(Laughter.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Anybody else? Seeing none, we're going to go to The Good of the Game. Anybody have any? Okay. Just line up. MR. BUSH: Tim Bush from Washington

State. I wanted to do a bit of a Walk Soccer update, and while I'm here $I$ have had contacts from various other states and if you want information on how to grow the game, get the information, the rules and all the rest, I'll be happy to provide it to us guys.

The good news is that we've expanded significantly beyond my state. We currently have five planned sites in Washington. I'm now looking at the possibility of starting the program in Vancouver, Washington which is obviously right across river from Portland, but currently on those five sites we have between 200 and 300 players a month that play generally in the drop-in games where people take two different types of candidates into play.

In discussions Massachusetts now has walking soccer, Georgia, Oregon, Idaho. Arizona is working on it. New Mexico is working on expanding the program. It's really easy to do and it takes you less than five minutes to setup and tear down and it's a
great opportunity for the social aspect, so if you want any more information if $I$ could be helpful at all, please contact me.

MR. MENGEL: My name is Gerhard Mengel from the State of Michigan. I'd like to entertain a motion to have in 2021 the USASA AGM in Alaska.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Do we have a second for that motion?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
(Laughter.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: I thought you didn't want us to travel to exotic places. Do I have a motion? I got a second. All those in favor for Alaska? Aye. Opposed? Nobody. Okay. Better get a good deal.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Tom?

MR. MOORE: I'd just like to say that I was very, very pleased at the turnout at yesterday's workshop at the State Association in a Box, so for those are you were able to
attend, it was an excellent turnout, but more importantly, as we pointed out, this is a future team effort and it's crowd sourcing. We hope there is stuff that helps all of us, so $I$ was very, very heartened at the number of folks who've come up to me and said yeah, we got a document on a particular topic that we can share with you. Please send to it Jen who now has the torch to carry this forward, but thank you very much for those of you who have volunteered to provide things and those of you who think about that, please get in touch with Jen who will get in touch with me and we hope to have a very good product going forward.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you. Chaz?
MR. BALLISH: I just wanted to thank everyone. I'm truly humbled by the votes and I want to thank Werner Fricker for all that he has done. He's not here, but he's a legend and $I$ have huge shoes to fill and I'll try my best, $I$ can promise you that, and $I$ want to thank Paul publicly. It was a good race. It
was clean. There was nothing behind anybody's back and I'm proud to be part of this association and $I$ hope to make you proud. Thank you.

## (Applause.)

MR. FALCONE: Tony Falcone. So while we had the election for the At-Large member, I have been texting black and forth with Werner. Werner and I go back a long time ago when we were both very young. They say the 50's are the new $30{ }^{\prime} s$, so $I$ guess the two of us didn't really age too much, did we?

First of all, congratulations to you, Chaz, on winning the election. And he thanks everyone for allowing him to serve this association. So, you know, I wish my good friend Werner good luck and health and I'm pretty sure we'll be seeing him.

The other thing I did want to bring up is that last month Region 1 and the Maryland State Soccer Association hosted the Championship of Regions and it was the three cups, Werner Fricker Open Cup, the Werner

Fricker Cup, Gerhard Mengel Cup and the Over 40 National Cup.

We had the Lansdowne Yonkers FC from Eastern New York who were the winners of the Werner Fricker Cup. The Maryland Bays from Maryland was the winner of the Gerhard Mengel Cup and Jake Stars Punishers from Illinois won the National Over 40 Cup and it was a pretty good year for Region 1 .

I'm happy for my teams to do well, but a lot of great competition out there. Really good teams and we really should be proud of the efforts that our team has put out there and I think we as an organization, whether it be USASA or whether it be USASA Regions, state associations, do a lot to promote our teams and our leagues for what they do in providing and playing this great game to so many players. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Since I see no one else, $I$ just want to -- are you waiting to speak? Come on up.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I want to mention
that we have some states that have already been to the Florida classic and it's a great weekend. It runs very smooth. Don't worry about it. Everybody come out. Check out the website. Bring some teams out. We're over 40, over 50, 65, 70. Come on and enjoy the weekend with us.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Say the date again.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Martin Luther King weekend in January. January 17 th through the 20th.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you.
MR. MOELLER: Hello. First of all, I'd like to say thank you very much personally for your support for me for re-election. I'll do the best $I$ can and $I$ will be there for you.

Just like John said, I'm available. You can call me or email me and text me. I'm always there. I want to congratulate all today's newly elected officials not only on the Board, but also in the Regions.

I look forward to working with you all. Those who did not win the election today,
there's a place for you. There are a lot of resources in the room, so don't hesitate to come to us and say you want to participate on a committee.

One other thing, $I$ can't enforce it enough. John mentioned it earlier. And that is that the U.S. Soccer Federation has a \$3 million Innovative To Growth fund. They only gave out the last few years $\$ 1.8$ million. Last year we had three applications from the adults. Not acceptable.

We have money out there that's available. All you need to do is have an idea. If you don't know anything else on what to do, let me know, but the Federation, Brian is here to let us know. Brian and Caitlin and their department are there to help us out and they can walk you through it. The deadline is October 15 th.

We as an organization are also going to be working together diligently in the next few weeks putting something together as an organization, so if you have any questions
about it call me and I'll let you know how it's done.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: I guess I get the last word. First of all, $I$ want to thank everyone for being here. I think it was a great weekend. We're going to finalize it tonight with what $I$ think is the most important part of this weekend is recognizing the people who have contributed to our association for many years, so hope to see everyone there.

I would like to thank and congratulate Richard, Lori and Brett on their re-election. Chaz, welcome to the Board, but I also want to thank Paul for his years of service on the Board as Regional Director and Paul is not going away.

I already had a conversation with him earlier today. I already got a position for HR things to do, which $I$ know he'll do an absolutely great job and that is everything that we talked about, looking at our bylaws and our policy and $I$ think he will do a fantastic job.

## (Applause.)

PRESIDENT MOTTA: And also I'm going to ask Paul to get an attorney so we can make sure that all our bylaws conform with the state laws and all that so we'll get it and do it right.

Also on that note, $I$ want to thank werner Fricker. As Tony said, I think we all came into this association just about the same time as all state association presidents. So he's a dear friend of mine. I'm going to miss him on the Board.

He has a wealth of knowledge and, again, I will have to find a position to keep Werner in the loop because he's too valuable not to keep in this association, so I will do that.

To conclude my speech, and I mentioned this at the Board meeting the other might, I am thinking or contemplating running for the Office of Vice President of the U.S. Soccer Federation.

It's a position $I$ won in 1998 and have done the position before and I'm contemplating
doing it again, but $I$ will only do it if $I$ could get the support of this group because you are my family, the people $I$ would need for initial support, so in the next few weeks I probably will call some of you or most of you to get your opinions on that.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You want honest feedback?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Honest feedback because we know how elections are. We've all been through that, so tell me honestly what you feel. I will make a decision in the next few weeks, so I'm hoping to get the support from this group which $I$ have had the honor to lead the last few years, so stay tuned for that.

So with that, motion to adjourn?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So moved.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you very much. We're adjourned.
(Adjourned at 3:21 p.m.)
