MR. OLIVAS: Rick Olivas, Cal North. As I mentioned earlier today, we didn't get a copy of the minutes. I don't believe we did. If we could get another copy sent, we would appreciate it. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. We had a motion to accept the minutes. All in favor, say aye? Anybody opposed? Thank you. (Motion passed.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Next on to Communication. There's really no communication, so we'll go on with Reports of Officers and Committees.

So I will start with my report.
So good afternoon, delegates and guests. Welcome to Newport Beach. It's been a little bit warmer than we all expected, but better warmer than what's coming up ahead in the next few months, I guess, especially, if you live in the Northeast.

Hope everybody is having a great time here in Newport Beach and had very good productive meetings in the last few days.

I believe that USA is on its way, I mean the strategic plan that we set forth last
year. In one year, your board has worked tirelessly to work towards the goals, and after one year, I'm happy to report that we probably met all of our Phase 1 goals.

We have proposed two years. We have proposed between 2014 to 2016 to achieve those goals, and we've pretty much accomplished that Phase 1 part of the strategic plan in the one year, so as of today, I can stand before you and say that we've met those goals.

First, we've committed to work with four state associations to assist in player registrations, new revenue streams. We started the process with Maryland, Michigan, Florida, and Nevada. We met with each one of those states last year and set plans with each one of them. We have set them with a plan. Now it's up to them to go ahead and execute them.

During the process -- one of the states was Nevada -- and during the process, we have pretty much transformed Nevada into a whole new state association. While we were going through the process, we found that Nevada needed a lot of help, and we met with people in Nevada. And during that process, we got together. It was
a little painful, but the end result is great. We've kept the old leadership in place. We have added new leadership, and Nevada is well on its way to becoming the strong state association that it once was.

We now have chosen four additional states to work with, which doubles the goal from four states to eight states.

So the four states right now, are Rhode Island, Indiana, North Carolina, and Washington state.

The second goal from the plan was to expand the existing Veterans Cup from the old format and to a broader, to a more broader audience of more players and more opportunities. Also to derive some additional income to USASA. This year, we had the one event that encompassed all events in one venue. There was a lot of learning by doing this, and we took what we worked with. We're going to take what we worked with that worked well and remove what we didn't feel was a very good decision and change it for next year.

Next year's event will be bigger, and it will encompass a lot more competitions, which 16
will include walking soccer, 3-v-3 soccer, paralympic soccer. We will have a women's and men's open division. This is quite an expansion from where we were from the beginning.

The third goal was to maximize the effectiveness of the National Office while supporting the future relevancy, growth, and financial success.

Since 2004, USASA had only one year of positive growth in membership. Nine out of those ten years was all declining memberships, which was not a positive sign for USASA.

We needed the office to work with state associations to help grow their numbers, and I'm confident after this year, after we get everybody's numbers in -- the sooner, the better -- you will see an increase in our membership this year for the first time in many, many, many years.

We began talks with U.S. Club Soccer which at one time was a competitor of ours, and now they have joined the family and become a member.

That will bring in an additional 12,000 members into our family, which we didn't
have a year ago.
Duncan has secured our first national
partner in many years. We have been talking about getting a national partner, getting sponsors in. No success for many, many, many years. So after many, many years, Duncan has secured the partnership with Nationwide, which many of you heard from at the opening ceremony, at the opening day.

And we have collected from Nationwide this year, a check for $\$ 25,000$, and next year for 2016, they will give us another check for $\$ 40,000$. So that is a great, great way to start our sponsorship and partnerships with other organizations, and bringing in additional income to USASA.

We need to secure more of these partnerships, and Duncan will work hard in trying to secure more of this for the health and the future of USASA.

For those of you that haven't attended our events recently -- and I'm talking about the Veterans Cup and the Soccer Fest and all the other stuff we have been doing -- there's been a great increase in the branding of our 18
products. If you went to the Soccer Fest, we structured these huge big tents, where we actually had our office set up in, and the branding has just been tremendous in the last couple of years. You can't go to one of our events today and not know it's a USASA event.

I know a few years ago, when we went to Escondido for the Veterans Cup, you really didn't know if it was a Southern Cal event or a USASA event, because we didn't have enough of our branding there. Today, when you go to one of our events, you know that it's a USASA event. We have branded our product pretty well.

So, in short, we had ourselves two years to complete phase one of our strategic plan, and again I'm proud to say, we've accomplished it in one.

We are now tackling Phase 2 of the strategic plan, and I'm happy to report that this board has looked very closely at the National Cup competitions, and collectively, we have made some very difficult decisions. We have eliminated the Open Cup, the National Under-23 cup, the National Over-30 Cup. We have also changed our Women's National Cup to an open entry tournament. These
decisions were made after reviewing the data for the last few years, its costs, and its relevance.

Soccer today is not where it was 20 years ago. I think we all realize that. It has evolved, and we need to keep up with the evolution and make the right decisions for USASA to stay relevant in years to come. We have appointed a new IT committee that is looking at all our IT systems. We sent them to Chicago to look at our computers, our data, what they're doing with computers and IT. And we spent the whole day there in analyzing all that information they got, because the future is IT, and I don't believe that USASA is where it should be when it comes to technology.

So the new IT subcommittee, which is kind of being led by Arthur, is looking at new ways to bring us to the next level. There will be more about this. There is -- it's in its infancy. They are working on it, so as soon as we have more information, you will hear more from Arthur and his committee, but I'm sure that going forward, we are going to have a technology system that should be second to none.

We're also going to focus on the
20
opportunities around small-sided games. Now we can tap into these areas of the game to grow the membership. As we know, soccer has taken on a whole new life. Today, the Millennials, what they like to do, they like to go to a field, get together, play kick-the-ball around for a few minutes, have a few beers and go home. There are definitely people out there that do like the competitive soccer, but I think what we're seeing is that soccer is going into more this recreational, let's have fun, let's get together, let's enjoy it, and move on.

So we're going to have to look at how can we tap into that audience and grow our membership through that.

So, as you can see, we have been working hard to meet the goals of the strategic plan. We still have lots to do. But I am confident that your elected board, along with support from our membership, will continue to grow USASA and remain the largest and the best National Association in the United States.

Thank you.
(Applause.)
MR. EJLALI: Out of 190 votes, we
have 177 present, 89 is your majority, 118 is your two-thirds vote.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Thanks, Darius.

Is there any other officers or committee members that would like to do a report at this time?

Seeing none, we will move along.
Unfinished Business, I don't think we have any Unfinished Business to deal with today.

Next, would be the budget. I would like to bring the budget up to the floor. And can I get a motion to approve the budget?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So move.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Is there a second?
MR. SCHERER: Second.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Now, we will open it up to discussion, and I'll begin the discussion with making, the board had met -- and I know I've met at your regional meetings, and I discussed this, so hopefully, we'll move this along -- we met at the board meeting that we had a couple of days ago, we met, and when we sent out the budget, we had made some amendments to the budget for you, to be ratified today by this 22
Council.
The first amendment that I would like to propose would be on line 92 of the budget that was sent out to the members, which was the line item for membership, for membership -- for standing committees, I'm sorry, standing committee -- what's listed on the budget right now was a \$500 line item for standing committees.

After we sent out the budget, I did receive a few phone calls that some members felt that 5,000 really was almost an insult to the committees, throwing so little money against people who are volunteering their time. We went back to the board and we decided that maybe there is, maybe that is true.

So, what I would like to propose is
that we make an amendment to change the $\$ 500$ to
$\$ 5,000$. Is there a second?
MR. SCHERER: Second.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Any
discussion around that?
MR. KEPNER: Bob Kepner, North Carolina.

Just to be sure, what we're looking
at includes your statement or not?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: What do you mean?
MR. KEPNER: Because it says, \$5,000
is here --
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Line 92 --
MR. KEPNER: 92?
PRESIDENT MOTTA: No, 94? Line 94, I was told.

MR. LA VIELLE: They're numbered on the left side of the page.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: If you look on the left side of the page, Bob, they're numbered.

MR. KEPNER: I'm not seeing that document. And that is a point that I want to go ahead and make, just as I made it in Region 3, and I'm going to preface the point with a question.

Are we an organization that is strapped for cash?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: No.
MR. KEPNER: Well, then, when you get to dealing with numbers, big numbers like this, I really feel that it's a good idea to carry, and provide everybody who attends, a copy of it in print. I fully recognize that this is a world of electronics, but, you know -- and we forwarded, 24
Lori did -- I don't feel that that's enough when you are dealing with large numbers. I made the same thing in Region 3, talking with Nick, and we ended up agreeing that we would, next time, but I just don't think that that's a fair thing to do.

So, quite frankly, I thought I'd printed everything. I didn't. Therefore, I don't have a copy of it. So...

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Point well taken. And I have heard that comment not only from you, Bob, but I have heard it from quite a few members, and I'm not disagreeing. So, going forward, I'm telling Duncan, he's here right now, that when we print out those booklets, we will have all the documents that we're going to be discussing in the future inside your book. So, we will have a budget. We will have any rule changes. We will have -- anything that would require your approval will be in this book going forward.

MR. KEPNER: Thank you.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: You are welcome.
Any other discussion on the amendment for changing line 94 from $\$ 500$ to $\$ 5,000$ ?

MR. FLAMHAFT: Good afternoon, Steve

Flamhaft from New York.
John, at our regional meeting, I had suggested that the money is going to be, being used, will be used at the discretion of the committee, am I correct?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Well, with approval of the Executive Director. I mean, we got to know what's going on, because they can't just go out there and decide, Well, let's all fly to California and not let either the president or the --

MR. FLAMHAFT: That would be in the extreme, but I'm talking about in general, is it not --

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Oh, in general, if they're going to have a call, and they need something, they can have that discretion, yes.

MR. FLAMHAFT: Thank you.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: If it's an extreme case, they should go to the Executive Director. Thank you.

MR. KEPNER: Before we vote, just out of curiosity, I thought there was a presentation at the NBOD, and the NBOD on Friday recommended that there would be a modification to the budget

in certain lines, and then an explanation about
that was made by its regional director today, and reinforced by you relating to the cups. Is that --

PRESIDENT MOTTA: That's the next one.

MR. KEPNER: Oh.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: I want to do them one at a time. I could have done them all, but I'm doing them one at the time.

MR. KEPNER: Okay. Thank you.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Any other
discussion? All those in favor, say aye?
Anybody opposed? Passes.
(Motion passed.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you.
Next, Bob, the Cup, the Amateur Cup.
If you look on line 37 of the budget, what was proposed, or what we sent you, was staging of the Soccer Fest event --

MR. RIDDLE: Amateur Cup --
PRESIDENT MOTTA: I'm sorry, sorry; Amateur Cup event, the Amateur Cup Finals. We have a $\$ 20,000$ line item for staging the event, and what we're proposing would be to drop that to

## \$10,000.

On line 38, referees for the Amateur Cup is currently listed at 10,000 . We would like to lower that to 8,000. And we would like to add a line that is not there for travel subsidies for three teams to travel for 15,000. So basically, end results would be we're saving 10 from the staging; two from the referees, so that's 12. We're just asking for another 3,000 for the travel subsidies. And the reason behind that is, basically, we're bringing the Amateur Cup to a different level, something we have not done before. And I'm a believer that the Amateur Cup should be the crown jewel of this association.

It's an event that's been held for over 100 years. There's a lot of history, and basically, USASA, in the early years, was built around that National Championship. So there's a lot of history, there's a lot of passion, there's a lot of meaning for the Youth Amateur Cup in this group.

So saying that, since we're going to be trying something new next year, which we haven't done, I feel that we should add the $\$ 15,000$ travel subsidy, because what we're going to be doing is asking one of the four finalists to host the event. So that means that one team will host, so they would not have to travel; three teams would have to travel. So, in fairness, three teams would have to spend money to go, and one guy would just sit back at home and not do anything, just host the event.

So we felt that we need to put $\$ 15,000$ for travel subsidies for the three teams that will have to travel to the event, and they will be distributed based on need and travel distance. So Region 14, that might have to travel to Region 1, may get a little bit more money than a Region 2 or Region 3 team that may have to have less travel upon them.

So, it will be done, you know, through the committee in the office. They will evaluate where the teams are coming from, and where they're going, and who needs the most money. So it's not a $\$ 5,000$ split between three regions. It will be based on the travel of the team that needs to go the furthest.

So those are the three amendments we would like to make to the budget that you have, that was sent to you. Can I have a motion to

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approve?
MR. BUSCH: So moved. PRESIDENT MOTTA: And a second? MR. SCHERER: Second. PRESIDENT MOTTA: Any discussion?
Seeing none, all those in favor say aye? Anybody opposed? Thank you.
(Motion passed.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Third one, very easy.
We forgot, and it was an oversight, that the Referee Achievement Award and the Coach of the Year Award at the regional level, we changed it from hosting it here and having an awards luncheon, and we felt that it's a better award to be given at the regional level. I mean, these people are at your regions. They should be recognized in front of their peers that are closest to them.
So we took it out of this event, and we told the regions, it's up to you now to recognize your Coach of the Year, and your Referee Achievement Award Winner, but we did say we would still support it financially from USASA. So we did forget to add the \(\$ 8,000\) to the budget, 30
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which would be 2,000 per region to host the event or to do what they need with the money to run the event.

So I would like to propose an amendment of -- it's a new line item -- the Referee of the Year and the Coach of the Year Award of \$8,000.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So move.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: And second?
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Any discussion?
Everyone in favor say aye? Okay. Thank you.
Approved.
(Motion passed.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Moving right
along -- I might break a record today.
Now, we have the budget with the amendments approved. So, next, there's already been a motion to approve it, and a second. Discussion on the entire budget?

Who wants to go first? Tim.
MR. BUSCH: In general, I support the budget. I would like to discuss the $\$ 40,000$ that goes to the region. I'm not sure it pertains to the budget, it's a policy item I think, it's
separate. So, what's your preference? Do we talk about it now or do we approve the budget, and then talk about how the money is going to be utilized?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: If you are going to want to make a change to the budget --

MR. BUSCH: It's not to the budget.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: It's the policy.
MR. BUSCH: It's the policy related to how the $\$ 40,000$ is used.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: So, it would be later. We have to approve the budget first.

MR. BUSCH: Thank you. I will bring it up later.

MR. KEPNER: This is relevant to the budget itself, or the cash flow, in a sense. The report that we did receive -- and, hey, I did print one thing, that's good -- but Lori very nicely sent out to us on October 5th, a budget versus actuals, January 1 through August 31.

You read this, and it's a very alarming report, quite frankly, because we were only two-thirds of the way, based on historical record, of 37 percent of player registrations had been collected, whereas customarily,

historically, 55 percent at that point.
So I'm asking, before we adopt a budget, a new budget, I thought I would just throw out the question, perhaps to Lori, perhaps to you, perhaps to Duncan, we've gotten to the end of September, and I realize in accounting, we can't do it immediately, but do we have any sense at all of whether or not we're catching up?

MR. RIDDLE: I would say the question should be sent back to you, because you're the ones I'm waiting for the registrations from.

MR. KEPNER: No, no -- I hear you --
PRESIDENT MOTTA: One at a time.
Lori.
MS. STONEBURNER: In September, we are trying to catch up, but again, it will be, it's low, and we have to start training people to submit the registration more timely.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Can't hear you.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Use the mic, please.

MS. STONEBURNER: So I think that we are catching up in September, so what we have to do is to start training people to submit

registrations every month. In the past, we've left August open a lot longer, because that was our fiscal year end, so we've seen more players registered by the end of August, but I do think that we are catching up.

MR. KEPNER: Well, it's good to know that.

Just to respond, since I have the mic now, to Duncan's response to me --

MS. STONEBURNER: Can I sit down?
MR. KEPNER: I hear your point, Duncan, but it -- it is a working relationship here.

The point that you were making has never been articulated very clearly. You know that North Carolina is one of the state associations that pays fully. We mail in two payments a month. We pay it by the end of the month and get it in. So I do feel that that's a good practice, but historically, that has not been the standard of practice for the vast majority of associations.

I mean, I remember some that do it twice a year and so on. So, if you are proposing a change -- and I heartily endorse your 34
suggestion, Duncan -- then I would encourage that be something that be communicated through regions and directly to state associations.

But my question really was directly related to, how are we doing? Are we doing better? And Lori has answered the question very clearly that she thinks that we're getting better.

MR. RIDDLE: Bob, it's a good point.
The changing of registrations and submitting them is we, traditionally -- we don't go and pressurize you, do we? We understand that you are volunteers, and the summer season is always the busiest season, and then the fall -- so traditionally, we get the registrations from you guys September through December, because September is the cut-off date to get your registrations in anyway for the AGM vote.

So, yes, it would be great practice if you could send me the check every month, but I
think we've always tried to work with you, because we understand, as volunteers, you can't do that all the time.

Now, obviously, it would be perfect.
Bob has done a great job, and he actually does
his weekly at times for the year, which is fantastic, but I think we understand how difficult it is for you to get those registrations together.

So, yes, I don't, we don't come, make many phone calls right now, but when we get to October, November, I think, traditionally, we always send you e-mails, and we start to chase you, because we say please get the registrations in, because we need them before the end of December ready for the AGM vote. So that's kind of, we're trying to work with you, I think, is what I'm trying to say here.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: And to add to that, I know my predecessor in the past, when he didn't get his registrations in on time, would personally call a lot of state associations and ask for you guys to send in the money.

Again, as Duncan has said, you know, we understand that everybody in here is a volunteer, and some of them, some of us, as North Carolina, probably are better equipped to do that bimonthly, whereas other states maybe are not well-equipped to do that.

So, you know, we work with you. We
trust you. We don't think anybody here is going to not pay the registration, but if it could be done in a little bit more of a timely matter, just so that we don't have to do a phone call to you, that would be appreciated.

MR. RIDDLE: Just to add to what John said. A couple of times in the past when previous people put some pressure on states to pay, people would write a check out, panic, and the numbers weren't quite right, and then it would actually get to past Christmas, and actually, they didn't have those numbers, and so reconciling them was more difficult, and it causes more of a problem.

So, I think that's kind of where we are at right now.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Any other discussion on approving the budget?

MR. BUSCH: Call for the question.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Call for the question. All those in favor of approving the budget say aye? Anybody opposed? Thank you very much.
(Motion passed.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: So next, New

Business -- we will have Tim come up, Tim first.
MR. BUSCH: I want to happily
report -- Tim Busch, Washington State -- that Washington pays a minimum of six times a year, and John Hagen, my treasurer, can confirm that. So I think it is important to turn it in for the cash flow in the organization.

So for just a moment, I would like to revisit the great compromise of Manhattan Beach, 2014, between myself and Richard Groff dealing with the $\$ 40,000$ that go back to the regions for operation programs, and at that particular time, we agreed that of the $\$ 40,000$, fully half, at least half, had to be spent on USASA competitions.

The one thing that I have learned in the 25 years that I have been involved at the national level is that we all love the game. Sometimes, we don't look like we love the game. We certainly don't always agree, but we have to understand why we love the game -- while we love the game, that there are things that set us apart and make us different.

And I attended the NBOD meeting on Thursday when the cups and the changes and 38
everything were discussed. And looking at the opportunities we have for running competitions in Region 4 and in the West, I believe and on behalf of my state association, I want to make a motion that the $\$ 40,000$ are sent to the regions without any restrictions, with the caveat that on an annual basis, the regional treasurer provides a detailed accounting of how that money is spent to the NBOD and clearly to the treasurer of the NBOD.

So that's my motion.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Is there a second?

MR. FRICKER: Second.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Now, I'm not a parliamentarian, and I'm just asking the question. What is the procedure of changing our policy?

MR. SCHERER: We just vote on it.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Simple majority.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Simple majority?
I'm asking the question. Simple majority.
MR. SCHERER: Yeah.
MR. KEPNER: Well, the first question
has to do with what our bylaws specify as to how we modify policy and establish policy. So it's less a matter of Robert's Rules of Order than it is in terms of our own bylaws. So it's quite possible -- and I'm not disagreeing with Tim at all here in terms of the principle of this thing, but I am saying that whatever we, as an organization, have determined to be our procedure for policy approval, adoption, and amendment, is what we should follow.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Call the question.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay.
MR. BUSCH: I was just going to make a point and not belabor it. We made a policy decision by simple majority at the last meeting, and I think that's the appropriate approach.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. I just wanted clarification. I want to make sure we do it right.

MS. RICHARDSON: Karissa Richardson, Minnesota. I'm the chair of the Rules Committee.

Our bylaws don't provide for advance notice of a policy change, and it does provide for a majority.

40
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Perfect. That's all I needed to know. Okay, so we got a motion and we got a second.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: New Mexico; second.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Is there any further discussion on Tim's motion?

Now, that would be the current 40,000 dollars that are going to the regionals would be total unrestricted with the caveat that the regional treasurer must report on how those 40,000 dollars were used up to the national treasurer.

Any other discussion? Yes. Bill, up here.

MR. DAVEY: Just a question for you. Bill Davey, Director Region 2.
Is this going to be a separate report or does the budget suffice, the original budget?

MS. STONEBURNER: It should be the actuals.

MR. DAVEY: Okay, it should be the actuals? Okay, I just wanted to make that clear, that we're adding another step in the process that actuals need to be submitted to the office.
Okay

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Bob.
MR. KEPNER: I am going to ask Tim, and Tim and I are not the only two, and Steve, to talk from the floor, but I would recommend that we determine a starting date for the policies to take effect. So, we are in a middle of a fiscal year. I would suggest --

PRESIDENT MOTTA: For this next
budget.
MR. FRICKER: So 2016.
MR. BUSCH: Did we not move to the calendar budget?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Yes.
MR. KEPNER: That's all I'm saying;
specify that it's for the next one. I don't recall that it was included, that's all I'm saying.

MR. BUSCH: Good point.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: It will be for the next budget cycle that we are working on approving or we just approved.

Okay. Any other discussion? All in favor say aye? Anybody opposed?

All right. I think the majority was
42
yes, so it passes.
(Motion passed.)
MR. FLAMHAFT: I'm taking this opportunity to ask this organization to censure Chuck Blazer for bringing disgrace and shame to the organization for his unethical, corrupt and immoral conduct.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
MR. FLAMHAFT: May I speak to the motion?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Yes, you may, sir.
MR. FLAMHAFT: If this motion is not
sustained or approved, what is the message that we are sending to the international soccer community? That we don't care about the conduct of those who represent our country in the highest echelons of the game? I think we should, and yes, I do, in fact, think, we do care.

As a life member, I care deeply about our reputation and standing on the world soccer stage.

One of our core values listed by our organization is that we honor our history.

Chuck Blazer has dishonored the
unblemished history attained by our previous leaders through their efforts as well as blood and tears.

I have firsthand witnessed the dedication and commitment expended towards protecting our position and image. It was accomplished with dignity and integrity.

I believe that it is the appropriate time, as well as appropriate, that we censure Chuck Blazer.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Any other discussion?

MR. BOLLINGER: Jim Bollinger, Eastern Pennsylvania.

I thoroughly support Steve's motion. I think we cannot stick our heads in the sand. We need to acknowledge the fact that there's been misdeeds done here, and we have to react accordingly, because the misdeeds done by this gentleman besmirched all of our efforts also.

Thank you.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you. Andy.
MR. MARION: Andy Marion, South
Carolina.
I, too, would like to support Steve's 44
motion, even though, as we all know, the courts are going to take a while to work through all of this, that the FBI and other investigative bodies are going to take a while to get through all of what they need to do. Nevertheless, it's been out a long time. This has been over a year or so that all the news has been coming out.

We may not know all the details, but we know what happened, and it was awful. It was embarrassing to us. It was embarrassing to world soccer, and we should state very clearly and strongly that we are appalled by this type of thing, and we want no part of it.

So for our good name, I think we need to make a strong statement. So I support this motion.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Thank you. MR. CONSELYEA: Ken Conselyea, Southern Ohio.

Those of you that attend the meetings know that I don't get up in front of a microphone very often, but I feel strongly that this motion should be passed, and...what he said.

MR. KEPNER: I don't question the emotion, and the basic elements related to this
motion. There are a couple of questions that pop into my mind. The motion was stated in terms of "this organization." So, and it was stated, quite frankly, I think, in language that is very direct, to harming "this organization."

As the motion was being presented, I was going through, in mind, wondering what Chuck Blazer, what role he's had with "this organization." I could be wrong, because I'm not a historian. But I don't think he's had any direct relation ever to "this organization."

Perhaps, he has. Somebody just said yes. Steve Flamhaft. Well, perhaps, you will give us that information.

The second thing is that, as I was coming up, I couldn't help, I mean, Steve is an attorney, Flamhaft is an attorney. I am not.

So, I just don't know whether or not if passing a motion of this sort, Steve, has any possible adverse impact on us. I just don't know. It's just a question that's in my mind. Please, understand, I do understand, and I fully accept the basic element, the basic direction of this motion. But I think we should, whatever actions we take as a national body, and that's 46
what we are, we are functioning for the United States Adult Soccer Association, that whatever action we take in a formal fashion, because that's what we're doing here, we should take with specific facts in mind and have a good solid sense of the direction that we're taking. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Saying that, Steve, I think it would be beneficial for the body, if you could just give us a very brief history of Chuck's involvement with Adult Soccer, if you don't mind.

MR. FLAMHAFT: The facts are that he comes from New York. He was involved in the youth movement. He was involved and instrumental in many of the policies that became policies in Eastern New York state as well, and the overall effect of his participation is apparent, and the damage that he has done to the organization is apparent.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you.
Any other comments? Sal, are you coming up? Okay. Next.

MR. KAHLER: Harold Kahler, Iowa Soccer Association.

I just want to address this issue about whether or not he's been associated with the organization. The fact of the matter is he's breached a bond that everyone in this room, that all the Federation, all U.S. Youth, whomever that is, he's breached that bond of volunteerism, and obviously, he's admitted it.

So, again, it's not specifically, perhaps, about USASA, but it's about the way that he's conducted himself for the love of the game.

I don't think anyone in this room would do that.

I, in fact, I think most of you probably take money out of your pocket. You don't put it in your pocket. Some of you have paid your way to come here. Some of you get in the car and drive 100 miles to see a match. Some of you run leagues, and probably have to pay money out of your pocket for some of that operational expense.

That's what he has breached. And I would certainly support the censure.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you. Sal.
MR. RAPAGLIA: I agree with the gentleman, Mr. Kahler, I don't know who could do that. The man is going to be found guilty now, I understand, is the assistant D.A. there, in South Carolina, found guilty.

But let me ask you something; as a body, can we do that? By the way, for the record, we are against the motion of -- Steve is acting as a life member, not as Eastern New York. We don't want to get into it there. We have been friend with Chuck since 1982, '83, so a long time. Whatever he did, he did, if he's guilty, he's going to be guilty, but I would note, if we, we could make a, to, that he disgraced us. He never belonged to us.

I'm president since 1979. He belonged to the youth. He was a second VP of Eastern New York youth. I was president of Eastern New York senior, amateur. So I don't know if this thing is really legal to do that.
If you guys want to give a black eye to Chuck, it's, you know, but we, from Eastern New York, we abstain. We do not agree.

Thank you.
MR. BALLISH: Chad Ballish, from

## South Carolina.

I just want to put on the record that

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he had plead guilty to ten counts of
racketeering, wire fraud, money laundering, and
tax evasion. I just think it's important to have
that on the floor.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you.
Anyone else? Steve?
MR. FLAMHAFT: In conclusion, I have waited approximately several years before I made this application and this request. I have been told by many people not to make this application. Those people are not in this room now.
I think the organization, the USSF, has been remiss and has failed to make the same application, with all due humility, that I have the courage to make at this point.
Thank you.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Bob. Let's have Dick go first, because he hasn't spoken yet.
MR. BURNS: I never get to the mic. But I want to remind people that Chuck was a vice-president of U.S. Soccer. And that has not been mentioned. And that is, he used that as a stepping stone to CONCACAF, to Jack Werner, and I can't believe that there wasn't intent all along. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you.
And we'll add Bob as the last speaker, well, second-to-the-last speaker. And that's it.

MR. KEPNER: Again, I consider this to be, we're a very serious well-structured history-bound organization. I would urge that we fully, in writing, carefully craft a motion that is very specific.

I certainly understand the emotions
in this, and I fully understand the statements that were made about what is on the record already. There might be reasons to which I'm not privy, or to which we're not privy, as to why U.S. Soccer has failed to take action. I don't know. I would move, however, to delay. I support the concept, but I feel that we should study it carefully, craft it carefully, and make a decision on acting at our Annual General Meeting. So I move to delay.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay, is there a second?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second. PRESIDENT MOTTA: A second. So what
does the parliamentarian thing on --
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: There's a motion on the floor.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: So there's a motion on the floor, seconded, to delay the action until the AGM.

MS. PUGLIESE: No, we have already accepted --

PRESIDENT MOTTA: No, that's --
MR. LA VIELLE: You have to accept it.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: We got a second.
MR. TRAINOR: You deal with the delay first, and if it passes --

PRESIDENT MOTTA: So is it a simple majority is the question?

MR. TRAINOR: Correct.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: All those in favor of delaying the action by Steve until the AGM, say aye? Anybody opposed, no.

It might be voting card time.
All those in favor of delaying this, please put up your yes cards. Yes cards up.

MR. EJLALI: For the purpose of counting properly, the Credentials Committee
would like to take a row at a time. So if you don't mind, so that we can get proper counting, everybody but the first row, and then we'll go to the second, the third, the fourth, please. Let's do a row at a time, please. Row 1, please hold your cards up.

Row 2, Row 3, Row 4.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: All those opposed to delaying this until the AGM, please put up your no cards. One at a time. Row 1, Row 2, one more row, 3. Are we done with Row 3? And Row 4 over here? Darius, do you have Row 4 back there? And then Board of Directors.

Okay. Okay. We will wait for the count.

Okay. It was approved that we delay this until the AGM.

So there will be no further action.
MR. FALCONE: Point of order.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Point of order by Tony.

MR. FALCONE: Okay. So I did a quick search on Roberts Rules. And Bob, while your name is Robert, you may have your own set of rules. Just to clarify the motion, what you
referred to as the motion to delay, the correct term -- where did I have it?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: To table.
MR. FALCONE: No, not to table. I had it in here, let's see.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Postpone to a date certain.

MR. FALCONE: No, it was even more specific than that. Postpone to a certain time. So technically what we did with your motion was to postpone to a certain time. I just want to correct that for the record.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Good. Thank you.
MR. KEPNER: I always appreciate being corrected.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Yes, sir.
MR. MOORE: Mr. President, I would
like to make a related motion, since this has been delayed to the AGM. I would like to move that when we take this vote on the censure, we insist on using the voting cards, and that we get a photograph of that.

I think that will put a visual point
-- I have little doubt that a properly crafted
censure motion is going to pass. I got that

sense, probably, unanimously, and I think it might be important to have a photograph of everybody with their hands up, with a yes sign, approving that censure motion.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: I will take that under advisement.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: I don't think that's --

PRESIDENT MOTTA: I'm sorry.
MR. FLAMHAFT: Mr. Chairman?
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Peter, I don't even know if that's legal, so we'll investigate.

MR. FLAMHAFT: Mr. Chairman?
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Yes, sir, I mean, Steve.

MR. FLAMHAFT: I accept the decision of the body. May I wonder or ask or is it a consensus that I bring it forward at the AGM?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Yes.
MR. FLAMHAFT: Thank you.
MR. PINORI: Mr. Chairman?
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Yes, sir.
MR. PINORI: I resent what the gentleman just said to us. What he's actually saying to us, to me and the people that counted,
that we did not count correctly. I resent it.
Even if we have nothing to do one way or the other; our only job is to actually count and if you don't trust us -PRESIDENT MOTTA: Guys, hey, wait, one guy is speaking.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No, no.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Anything else for New Business?
Okay. Rob.
MR. LA VIELLE: Good afternoon, Rob LaVielle, Region 3 Director.

This is a suggestion, unanimously, from Region 3 would be the National Cup Committee consider looking at the finals be a round-robin for the amateur play. We have teams that participate every year and want to continue it, but our point is going and potentially only having one game, getting beat. Yes, unfortunately, they got beat, but we would propose to the committee to look at a round-robin for the National Cup finals.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Jim Sadowski.

MR. SADOWSKI: Jim Sadowski, from

## Metro D.C. Virginia.

I think this is maybe under old
business, but I got up at one of these meetings
and asked that the board consider making sure
that members are doing what they were supposed to
do, and I don't have the exact phraseology.
John, I think it might have been your first
meeting, you said, we're the board, we're going to look into it. We got an e-mail a couple of weeks later, saying here's the deadline for this, and that and the other. And here we are again, and we have our Executive Director saying, when are you guys going to give us our player registrations so we have money in the bank to pay our bills?

So I put it on the board. The board has not done it, and I'm going to put it now on you, Darius, as the Credentials Committee chair. At the next Credentials Committee report, our state requests that you list those states that are in good standing and are not in good standing, because I am tired of coming to meetings where state associations don't do what they're supposed to do, and they get all the
privileges and benefits of being a member in good standing.

And we don't have money in the bank and we're not getting the player registrations, and we can't market the organization, and we can't do any of this stuff.

So at the next meeting, please, as a
Credentials Committee report, and you can get the
figures from Duncan, I'm sure he knows who hasn't
done it, what states are in good standing, and that means, they've complied with the registrations from the prior year. They've submitted the names and addresses, and all the other stuff that they're supposed to do. These are the minimum requirements. It's not hard. Okay. And if we don't get that Darius, I want a roll call vote by state.

So I trust that you don't want to do that, right? Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Tony will respond.
MR. FALCONE: A few items. First of
all, the termination of who is in good standing
is not the role of the Credentials Committee.
That's the role of the Board of Directors.
Second, no one is in bad standing in this
58
organization. The cash flow, and we discussed
this last year, when we decided to change the
fiscal years, we knew the cash flow was going to change, because traditionally, when we had our September to August 31st fiscal year, a lot of registrations would come in during the fall season. A lot of states start their registration periods in September, which means that a lot of the registration monies start coming in October, November, and December. That's always been traditionally the case.

The thing is that now that we've changed fiscal years, where most of our expenses are during, probably during April through July, our cash flow is in the negative, but that's just the cash flow. What will happen is at the end of the year, when all the registration comes in, we're going to be above, and it's just something we knew was going to be a change in our business practice, because we changed the fiscal year to a calendar year.

So it's not a question of people in bad standing. It's just that that's the way the business cycle works. And at this point, there's been no one brought up to be in bad standing, and
registration has come in from states, through the various periods of time, but it's during their usual cycle that they have been doing for years and years and years, and I expect that come December, most of the states will have their usual numbers or close to it, that they have from year to year.

MR. SADOWSKI: I don't agree, and I would ask the distinguished gentlewoman from Minnesota, as the Rules Committee Chairman, if she can, prior to the beginning of the next meeting, tell us what the rule is. Because I know there's a bylaw in there that says within 30 days or $X$ days, the state association must provide this, that, and the other, and this is simple stuff, their player registrations, name, address, date of birth, and payment. That is in the rules.

All right? And if it's in the rules, then we need to follow the rules and stop this business of being an organization, as a culture of noncompliance, as evidenced by this mumbo-jumbo, Oh, well, we had to change the fiscal year, we had to do that.

Baloney, all right? You have to 60
provide your player registrations, as a state association, by a date certain. That is in the bylaws, and Minnesota can educate us about that. And Darius, I'm sure, will sort it out between her, and then. I don't want to spend a lot of time going back and forth with me and Tony debating. That will take all day.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Thank you, Jim.

MR. OLIVAS: Rick Olivas, Cal North.
I have to support Mr. Sadowski's statement, because I'm looking at the report that was in the package that I actually did receive, and 36 of the state associations that are listed here, that was given to us by USASA, have only made one payment or two payments during the whole year, and yet they have some figures that would indicate that they have had more than one or two months where they have had registrations submitted.

We submit our registrations monthly, except in August, because we change our fiscal year then, but other than that, we're submitting it as per the policy every 30 days.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you. Lori.

MS. STONEBURNER: I just want to say, you know, as treasurer, I appreciate timely remittances. As president of Alaska, and registrar and treasurer, sometimes, we do the best we can; we're all volunteers or most of us, and we're doing, I think, for the most part, the best we can.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Mr. Kepner.
MR. KEPNER: North Carolina also is made up of volunteers. We have one state employee, but it's really volunteers that completely handle the matter of -- we do use online registrations, so that facilitates keeping up with registration -- but it's volunteers that handle the management of the money, the payment of money and the receipt of money.

Nobody is trying to argue here, really, all that's being said, and Jim's point is very simple and very straight forward. There's no argument here. There's no reason to oppose the concept of -- the National Office can certainly establish a way to inform state associations about the policy.

It's very correct. It's in the
bylaws, and it's a matter of holding to the
62
rules.
If we had a game, a soccer game, of all things, and out there, and one person kept kicking the ball out and going out and getting it, and bringing it back in, all by himself or herself, that's against the rules, you know.

So, it's just a matter -- and somebody, a person there with a whistle is going to call that person, Hey, you are violating the rules. In a very real sense, not paying your registration is a violation of the rules. It's not a big argument. It's just a matter of good practice, best practice. That's one of the things that the governance committee is emphasizing very capably and very thoroughly, and I appreciate the wonderful job that has been done by the committee and that was presented yesterday. It's simply a matter of good practice to pay the bills, pay the registration.

Because it's a bill. It's a
commitment. Thank you.
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you.
Okay. Jerry Zanelli.
MR. ZANELLI: I think what's going to happen very soon is that you are all going to be
challenged to hold an amateur cup, because, pretty much the WPSL is not going to be participating in the open cup, and our argument is why even hold one? We have 80 teams that are fighting, close to a 100, by the time we're done this year, they're going to be fighting to become the national champion. And in the past, our teams have been the ones who have supported the open cups, so it got to be ridiculous, that we're having two different cups going on in, in a sense. But part of the problem was, it is up to your amateur associations now, you have one cup, and it's up to you to produce women's teams that want to play in that amateur cup. There won't be any other strong teams that we're in. The W league is pretty much close to full even if you're down to nine teams.

So I think that this is up to you now to decide what you want to do as far as supporting women and try to put some effort in to building some teams to come to play in your amateur cups. So that's all I wanted to add. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you.
Seeing no more speakers out there,
motion to adjourn?
Oh, well, I'm sorry a couple of announcements to make before --

MR. MARION: Are we in the general Good of the Game?

PRESIDENT MOTTA: We usually do that after we adjourn, right?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKERS: No. PRESIDENT MOTTA: I tried. MR. MARION: I made a promise last night to Duncan, that I wouldn't stand up and embarrass him or make any snide remarks about anything, but the truth is, he was blocking my way to the bar. That promise was made under severe duress, but in the spirit of keeping that, I won't complain about anything, but just a positive suggestion. USASA has a long tradition of not putting anything into writing. The NBOD, and the staff, they just sort of always assume that everybody in the room knows everything, and we don't need to put anything in writing, even the posting, because we know these things.

So, whether it's -- whatever happened to the seasonal year, Duncan's favorite topic, or what's the status of all of the cup competitions
and where and when they're going to be playing, and so that a team, or a player can go to the USASA web site and know what competitions are available, whatever the issue is, I would encourage USASA to put more things in writing and to post them on the web site, whenever appropriate.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Point taken. Thank you.

MR. PINTO: Peter Pinori, Eastern New York.

I heard that our registration numbers seem not to be going up this year, and I'm thinking, is it because we incorporated U.S. Club Soccer, or did I miss -- I don't know if we are supposed to vote on here for that, or automatically, the board does what they feel is necessary to do -- but I would like to know, I could understand why U.S. Club Soccer might be beneficial to USASA as a whole, because we get 12,000 actual players. I guess that's the number I heard, but what I do not understand is how does that benefit a state or a league within the state? So I would like to understand that.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Okay. Peter, last
66
year, this board did ratify the adoption of U.S.
Club as a member, so this board did approve that, the National Council did. Now, you've got to understand that we are governed by the rules of U.S. Soccer, and the United States Olympic Committee. They clearly state that anybody that meets the criteria that's listed in our bylaws, we cannot deny them membership. Cannot.

So, when they applied to be a member, we looked at the bylaw, and they met the criteria that was needed to become a member. We could have said, we could have voted no, and they could have walked away. They could have challenged us at U.S. Soccer, and we would have lost, guaranteed, because we cannot -- if they meet the criteria, the United States Olympic Committee clearly states you cannot deny membership. So they clearly met the criteria, and we had no, basic no other choice, but to allow them membership.

MR. PINORI: But John, or anybody on the board, can you give me a reason, why it would have been beneficial to us, like, for my league or for my state association? I think, personally, that eventually, they're going to
hurt us in a big way.
So, they have not touched us, Eastern New York. I think we must be doing something correctly, but I know they hurt the youth big time.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: That's their forte is the youth.

MR. PINORI: So I would think that, that's why I wanted to understand why we were voting for it. If we have to do it, and we have no choice, we have no choice, but I wanted to ask the question.

PRESIDENT MOTTA: Thank you.
MR. FALCONE: I'm going to put on my Maryland hat. So for the record, I'm Tony Falcone, in Maryland. And in our state, we have term limits, and for the office of secretary, the term limit is 31 years. So I just want to let everyone know, Anna Steffan has retired this past year, this past summer, after 31 years of service as our secretary.

This morning, at our Region 1
meeting, she was honored to receive the Livio D'Arpino Award for service. It's a very distinguished award that we give in our region, and she does become the first woman in our region to receive that award. She was also given lifetime membership with the Maryland State Soccer Association, first person to receive that lifetime membership. And we just want to thank Anna for all those years of service to us, and I ask everyone to give her a hand.
(Applause.)
(Standing ovation.)
PRESIDENT MOTTA: Sal.
MR. RAPAGLIA: Sal Rapaglia, Eastern New York.

We sent a proposal to change -- no, to make a rule, to have uniform fees for all directors that, for the directors that we pay, and for all the divisions in this country, and probably the Federation is going to say no, they really say no, probably it's too much work for them, you know, they got to put a couple of people work on that.

But anyway, we can do that, we need that, because in our, you know, Peter says that we have no problem. We have some problem. A fellow, he wants to put, a fellow puts, you know, from, like, he wants to give a double, double pay
to the referees. If they put it in writing many times, somehow, some way, the Federation, they feel that they are not jurisdiction. But, anyway, we are going to put that, we already put that by, it's about two weeks ago, already, it's in the proposal.

I know, the Federation, it's going to be a lot of work for them, anyway, but you know why, it would be very interesting to know, very interesting to know, as somebody that doesn't cheat, that tries to get more referees for them, and, you know, if he get out, if we pay $\$ 90$, and here comes another league, and he's going to say, give you $\$ 180$, that referee is going to go there. I mean, it's going to be a legal problem with that. So, we have the proposal in there, to the referees, because we draw, we won, so we won. Now, if they don't want to talk fraud, fraud in the federation, and they, and the Good for the Game, for the Good of the Game, we will put it on there, and then let's see what we accomplish. I hope you will support that. Because, it will be very easy for, for everybody to do it.

MR. MARTH: This is for the Good of the Game, and I think for the good of the organization. I was going to, sort of starting as, you know, it was about beating a dead horse, but I guess I'm going to take a swipe at it myself.

I know Steve Flamhaft. I've known him for a long time, and I know when he puts something up on the floor, he's very deliberate about what he does, and he gives good thought to it. You know, there's a lot of ways we can take a vote, a voice vote, our cards, we can take a roll call vote, but, you know, when people vote, I think most of us here, I think, all of us do it, you know, with the best intentions and do it very conscientiously. And to turn something like this into a spectacle, a mere spectacle, I think is demeaning to this organization, to take photographs of who votes how. There are ways to record who votes how, but something like this, especially in a matter like this, shouldn't be reduced to a spectacle that smacks of some kangaroo court. It should be a very deliberate vote, and that's all I would like to say. Thank you.
