PRESIDENT GROFF: Okay. MR. OLIVAS: Rick Olivas, Cal North. We would like to renominate Bill Bosgraaf for the position.

PRESIDENT GROFF: Bill Bosgraaf is already a member. He was elected last year. Is that okay? He is there.
I think there is one additional nomination.

MR. MATTSON: Yes, I would like to nominate Rob La Vielle, Region 3 Director, for Adult Commissioner position.

PRESIDENT GROFF: Are there any other nominations? Motion to have the nominations close. Second?

All in favor, say aye?
(Motion passed.)
PRESIDENT GROFF: Okay. There are four candidates for four positions. We can do

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this by acclamation.
All those in favor say aye. Anyone opposed?

There are four Adult Commissioners. (Applause.)
PRESIDENT GROFF: The next position is the election of the Adult Chair. Nominations?

MR. MARTH: Fritz Marth, Adult
Commissioner and Region I Director.
I would like to place into nomination
John Motta.
PRESIDENT GROFF: Are there any other nominations?

Hearing none, a motion to close the nominations?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Move to close.
PRESIDENT GROFF: Second?
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second.
PRESIDENT GROFF: All in favor say aye?

John Motta, Congratulations.
MR. MOTTA: Good afternoon, everyone,
and thank you. It's a huge honor to represent
all of you as the Adult Council Chairman.
Having no one run against me says a
lot. It's a huge responsibility that I'm assuming, and I will work hard to represent you as well as I can.

The one thing that I am not, I am not a genius. I am not -- I do not know everything. I will need to surround myself with people that are experts in different areas, and I will -- and that's where I will look for your help. I will need to surround myself with good people in order for us to achieve our goals.

I will say a little bit more later, but again, thank you.
(Applause.)
PRESIDENT GROFF: So at this very moment, John holds both seats on the U.S. Soccer Board of Directors, because he was elected last year, and now that he's elected chair, he automatically has a seat.

So I assume, John, you are resigning from the last year's election, which creates a one-year vacancy on the U.S. Soccer Board of Directors. We need to fill that position, and we need nominations.

And Mr. Motta will also run this election.

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in depth, of a quality nature, comprehensive, and complete. He's served Adult Soccer, all of us know that. He sits before us, has stood before us many, many, many times.

During the years of his involvement in soccer, his perspective and his experience have followed a complete wide broad perspective: Involvement at the youth level as a state president; involved with the pro level as a commissioner of the Professional A League; NBOD, seven years; USASA president, four years. This is a man to whom we all owe a very high level of respect.

One of the things that I have heard during the time that this election process has been going on -- and I don't like to have people at my back -- so one of the things that we have learned, that I have learned as we've gone through the process of looking at people is that there are three different candidates: Arthur, a friend of mine, has already been nominated; Richard, another friend, I'm nominating him. One of the things that I learned in the Region 3 meeting today is that there's a feeling that since Richard is not going to continue as a

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member of the USASA Board of Directors, therefore, that that in the very real sense disqualifies him as a good, solid legitimate member representing the Adult Council at the national level.

I don't agree with that philosophy.
I think the experiences that one has, if you
think about anybody who moves from a vice-president level or a president level to a higher position, CEO, anything of that sort, that it's the experience that counts.

This is a person that I have learned to know in terms of having the highest possible level of integrity. Richard and I don't always agree with each other, but you will know exactly where Richard stands.

One of the key points that I will offer to you is that when a person is working with the U.S. Soccer Board of Directors, having skills that are useful is very important.

One of the things that we have learned about Richard during the four years that he's been president is that he has used those skills to the advantage of USASA. He's devoted time, going around nationally to state
associations that were having difficulty, state associations that wanted to do different things and, perhaps, leave the organization.

The skill of negotiation is something that is important in terms of representing Adult Soccer at the next level, at the highest level. He's already been there for four years and would continue to do that. Negotiation is a skill that involves give-and-take. And representing any kind of organization involves a give-and-take.

A key element, I feel, is that U.S. Soccer shows to Richard a very, very high level of respect. We know him now as the next honoree, as the Werner Fricker Award recipient. It shows a great time spent and devotion given.

So I nominate my friend, our friend, our leader, Richard Groff.
(Applause.)
MR. MOTTA: Thank you, Bob.
Any other nominations?
MR. OLIVAS: Rick Olivas, Cal North again.

I'm going to try to get it right this time. I nominate Bill Bosgraaf.

MR. MOTTA: Okay. Any other 12
nominations?
MR. MOORE: I hate to interrupt the campaign speeches. This is Tom Moore, Northern California.

I'm just wondering where are we on this agenda? I know it's a little disadvantageous that we didn't see this agenda until it got put up on the meeting here. But I'm just wondering where we are on this agenda.

PRESIDENT GROFF: Tom, a vacancy was created that we did not know, a mandatory vacancy, so, therefore, we would have to add it.

MR. MOORE: So it would be under new business?

PRESIDENT GROFF: No, it's under election of Adult Chair. We have to fill that vacancy. So we put it in there. Thank you.

We would do resolutions next.
MR. MOTTA: Are there any other nominations for the representative on U.S. Soccer?

Seeing none, I will close
nominations.
Now, I believe, since we have three candidates for one position, that a majority will
be needed to have a winner, so we need 101 votes.
If we do not get -- if any candidate does not get
101 votes, on the first try, we will have a
second election, and I think we will continue that process until someone receives the majority votes.

MR. MC GEE: I have a point of clarification. My clarification is do the people sitting up here who don't have a vote in elections in USASA, do they have a vote in this election, because if they don't, then we need to have a new credentials report.

PRESIDENT GROFF: We need that additional credentials report.

MR. EJLALI: Okay. The credentials report for the election would be 185 is your total, making 93 the majority.

MR. MOTTA: So now -- we will give an opportunity for each candidate to address the body.

We'll start with Richard.
PRESIDENT GROFF: We actually decided this by drawing our names out of a hat, so I will go first.

You have three candidates. This is a

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very important choice for this body. You can't choose someone just because they have another position. You can't choose someone because they have no programs. And you can't choose someone when they would say, oh, he's not there anymore.

You have to make a positive choice for the future, just not of U.S. Adult Soccer, but of U.S. Soccer.

I can tell you, I am going nowhere for four years. And that was the commitment with my wife Maggie, because she knew it was a 24-7 job for me. Every morning e-mails, constant attention, helping the national office start selecting an executive director.

But this organization is my passion.
Now, it may mean, as I've already
agreed, to serve on the board of Delaware
Soccer -- because they're not represented today, and they're small, and they need help, and I want to help them. I have already said to John Motta, I will serve on any committee that he wants to appoint to me.

I am not going away. Anyone who thinks that I will disappear into the night, it's not going to happen. I stand before you, based
on my experience, my creativity, and my platform, not only what we have done, but what we need to do. U.S. Soccer is going to be a $\$ 100$ million business. We contribute $\$ 600,000$ to that. They don't need that money anymore. You need an advocate to bring that money back into this room, and the same thing for U.S. Youth Soccer and any other youth amateur affiliate.

You heard John, who's been talking -it's time that U.S. Soccer pays for our joint programs. The Under-23 program is critical. We heard our national team coach say today, for 20 years this organization, U.S. Soccer, has ignored the 18 - to 23 -year-olds. U.S. Soccer needs to have a platform for those players, those elite players.

This organization stepped forward when no one else did it. We were the only sponsor for the National Women's Soccer League last year. Yes, we put up $\$ 5,000$. We got our boards, but we said that women's soccer in this country needs to be developed with the best league in the world, and we need to invest every dime that we can to make sure it succeeds.

And it's not enough just to win gold medals with the women. We need to win gold medals for the men. All of our national teams have to be ready.

But what happens that we're not competing at the highest level for the Under-17s and Under-20s? Where is our strategy? That cannot happen in the future.

As you know, the Lamar Hunt Open Cup is a passion of mine. I played in it many years ago. Werner has been a great chairman there. We have fought hard. Four years ago, there were 16 amateur teams in that event. Today, four years later we will have 42 teams for the first time. But it needs to be 64 .

I don't believe now is the time to make a change. I believe you need the 16 years of experience on the Board, the U.S. Soccer Board. I believe my experience as your president has been very helpful. I want to continue to serve on the U.S. Soccer Board, and I want to represent U.S. Adult Soccer.

Thank you.
(Applause.)
MR. MOTTA: Thank you, Richard.
I guess -- Bill Bosgraaf?

MR. BOSGRAAF: Hello, everybody. As you know, my platform is to be in support and take that second position to support our president. I think we're all capable of doing a good job, and I also believe that our leadership coming from the USASA side is going to be more than capable to do everything that has been mentioned. And I believe that I can do a good job in that role and be part of that Federation board. So I already spent time going around to the regions, so I don't want to spend any more time on this.

And I would appreciate your support. Thank you.

MR. MOTTA: Okay. Thank you, Bill.
And last, we will have Arthur.
MR. MATTSON: Good afternoon, delegates.

First, I would like to thank you for the opportunity to allow me to serve on your National Board of Directors and your Adult Council. I also would like to thank U.S. Soccer for hosting this weekend's events here in beautiful New York City, a little chilly, but still very nice. And also remind you of our
mid-year meeting, which happens to be in the
sunny state of Florida in September, and I can
assure you all that white stuff you will see on the ground will just be beach sand.

Now, we have many important decisions to make today, but none more important than the decision of who we're going to send to the U.S. Soccer Board of Directors to represent you. Now, we've already chosen one of those two seats today. It was John Motta. It makes perfect sense. He's going to be our president moving forward. He's going to sit on our Board of Directors, and just like the rest of the Board of Directors on here, moving forward, they're going to be involved in the monthly meetings, the daily phone calls amongst board members, discussing the ways that we can improve USASA and how we're going to deal with the challenges that face us in the future. And that is why it is crucial that when we send a voice to U.S. Soccer, it is a unified voice from the Board of Directors that you elected to represent you.

And as a side note, it's been over a decade since we have sent a fresh voice and a new face to the U.S. Soccer Board of Directors. And

I think it is time. And I stand before you here today to ask for your support to be that second unified voice.

I don't want to take anything away from Richard, his accomplishments. They have been great. He's done a good job, and while we haven't agreed on everything, I think everybody can agree that he has put in a lot of time into this organization. And as any president that leaves a board, they always want to leave it a little bit better than they found it, and I am certain that everybody will agree that Richard can say that.

But this seat that we're voting on right now is not an award of service. Because, if it was, I would be the first one to vote for Richard. But it's not. This seat is way more important than that, and if we send somebody that doesn't sit on this board to the U.S. Soccer Board of Directors, that represents this board, it could potentially cause confusion, and it could potentially cause, you know, some misunderstanding, maybe some lack of communication, and it could potentially undermine what your board is trying to accomplish moving 20
into the future, because we're going to have a new president, and no matter what, our course of action is going to be changing.

Now, I know Richard says he wants to stay on the board and finish that term out for one year; that he may have some unfinished business, some -- tie up some loose ends. And I can assure you that John and I working together here on this board representing you at the Federation board, we can handle that.

Now, our relationship with U.S. Soccer is good, but I think it can be better.

For example, I don't think U.S. Soccer should serve as our personal ATM machine. And as one of my fellow board members put it, it kind of sounds like we go to U.S. Soccer like they're our mom and dad asking for an allowance. I think we're better than that.

But don't get me wrong. I look forward to going to the board and fighting for you and fighting for funding, for the projects and the programs here at USASA that make sense, that makes us stronger, because that's in everybody's best interests. I would much rather go to U.S. Soccer and ask for a fishing pole than
to ask for a fish every day.
Now we face challenges in the future.
Every state does. And we face competition.
Competition is good. Competition makes us stronger. Competition forces us to create programs that our members need and want. And we have to acknowledge that moving forward, and I think your new board does. And I know that by working together, we can assure that USASA is prepared to face those challenges in the future.

Thank you.
(Applause.)
MR. MOTTA: Okay. Thank you.
So, now, you all have your ballots in your packets. We are going to use the second sheet. The first one says "Adult Commissioner" ballot. We're not using that ballot. Make sure you are using the "USSF Board Representative" ballot. So if you can please fill it out with your vote.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: John, is it the green color?

MR. MOTTA: They're both white. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Green.
MR. MOTTA: I got two white ones.
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MR. EJLALI: Our first round of voting will be on the white ballots only. If you put your nominee on a colored one, your vote will not be counted, so please find your white pack and use your --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: There is no white one. What does it say on it?

MR. EJLALI: As John told you, it says the USSF Board Representatives. It has a space for one -- green.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Green.
MR. MOTTA: Okay. Somebody bring one
up and show us what you are talking about.
MR. ELJALI: There are white ones and green ones.

MR. MOTTA: So let's use the white for the first ballot.

All of the ballots are stapled
together; is that correct? In the back of the packet, there should be a white ballot that states USSF --

MR. GROFF: Hold on.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: It's on the back of the packet that says Adult Commissioners Ballot. On the back of that, it has "USSF Board

Representative" in the white.
MR. ELJALI: The colored ones we will use if we cannot get a majority in the first round. Go through your pack. It's based on the number of -- you get one per vote for your state. So if you have five votes, you are going to have five ballots, and that's going to include the colored ones. So find the white one at the back. The five white ones on the back, if you have five votes and fill that in, please.

PRESIDENT GROFF: After all the ballots are collected, and then they go back and figure out what the vote is, we will move on to the resolutions.

Nick, do you want to put up last year's resolutions.

If you can remember, last year, we passed three resolutions by the U.S. Adult Council. Let me tell you what the result was. Mandatory adult player liability insurance was accepted by the U.S. Soccer NBOD, and it was expanded to mandatory liability insurance for all players and staff.

I will say it, John will say it: Only white ballots this time. So if you have one
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vote, you have one white ballot. If you have two votes, you have two white ballots.

MR. MOTTA: We only use the green if we do not get a majority on the first ballot. We will use that for the second ballot.

PRESIDENT GROFF: So that was approved. You pushed it. They accepted it. Good idea.

Expansion of the amateur teams in the Lamar Hunt Open Cup. You pushed it. It went from 34 to 42. Another good event.

The National Amateur Championship for men and women. Last year, it was only for the men. This year in May, it will be for the men and the women.

We also gave you copies on your desk of those resolutions for last year.

For this year, the U.S. Adult Soccer Board of Directors and the Adult Commissioners recommend two resolutions. They were approved last night at about 8:30. We're going to show them to you one at a time. We are hoping to do this by voice vote.

The first is the U.S. Soccer National Amateur Championship. We just spoke about that.

Approved for men and women. The committee, whose head, the chair is John, after last year's
experience, they wanted to upgrade the elite status of this event. It is the U.S. Soccer National Amateur Championships.

And so we are recommending a $\$ 10,000$ prize to both the men and women's champion.

Any discussion on that motion? It's to be funded by U.S. Soccer.

Hearing no discussion, can I have a motion to approve.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Move to approve.

PRESIDENT GROFF: Second? UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second. PRESIDENT GROFF: All those in favor say aye? It's approved.
(Motion passed.)
PRESIDENT GROFF: The next resolution: This one is a resolution for an Under-23 Open Championship. This is very much in line with what Jürgen Klinsmann said we need to do something for the 18 and 20s, those elite teams. And so what we're recommending is a partnership of U.S. Adult Soccer and U.S. Soccer.

It'll be for Under-23 teams. It's a national championship. You come directly to the event, no regional qualifying. We want elite teams. Our goal the first year is 16 , played over a four-day period. And we have proposed a funding plan from U.S. Soccer of $\$ 40,000$ for field rentals, medical personnel, referees, awards, and then 20,000 from U.S. Adult Soccer to send our staff, manage the event, provide insurance, things of that nature. Is there any discussion? MR. MOORE: Tom Moore, Cal North. Just a quick question. This is a recommendation to, I presume, the Board of Directors or National Council of U.S. Soccer Federation, and similarly to the Board of Directors and/or national council of U.S. Adult Soccer Association.

What happens under this resolution if one or the other fails to approve the funding? PRESIDENT GROFF: Tom, what U.S.
Adult Soccer said is they will fund it themselves.

Is that a fair statement, gentlemen and ladies? Go ahead.

I'd remind all of you that this isn't
the first time a program has started this way.
The Veterans Cup, successful as it is, we got kick-started with 25,000 bucks for three years when Hank was the secretary general. And at one time, when my friend Werner Fricker was chair of the Competitions Committee, when we had such a thing, they took a recommendation to the U.S. Soccer Board to fund an Under-20 and an Under-23 National Cup. And we got them kick-started.

So I, like Arthur, like many of you, I don't like to go to U.S. Soccer for money, but as Richard pointed out, Jürgen made a really dynamic presentation this morning that rather impolitely alerted us to our deficiencies and exactly why we are where we are. And it was bad news. And one of the suggestions is where we are killing ourselves is right here, right here in this age group. And this is not going to be turned down.

But the other thing I'd suggest you do is don't forget while you are sitting in here as members of USASA, you are also state associations, and don't be hesitant about putting
something on your state association letterhead and sending it off to the secretary general suggesting to them that your state wants to be part of this and you really, really want the Federation getting behind this. Let's not just make this USASA. Let's spread it out.

PRESIDENT GROFF: Thank you, Mike.
Mike has been very invaluable. He's the chair of the Lamar Hunt Open Cup Committee. It's under his leadership that we got the 42 teams. He will be very instrumental in this as vice-president of U.S. Soccer. It's great to have you here, Mike.

Motion to approve.
UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: So move. PRESIDENT GROFF: Second. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Second. PRESIDENT GROFF: All in favor? (Motion passed.) PRESIDENT GROFF: So we have -- go back to the agenda. We have new business. Is there any new business that you want to bring to the U.S. Soccer Adult Council? We will continue to wait for the vote.

PRESIDENT GROFF: Okay. We have no additional meetings here. We're waiting for the vote tally. Do we have one? Okay.

My suggestion is that we go back -the parliamentarian says that we have to sit and wait.
