Next, we have Reports of Officers and Committees.

I'm going to begin by giving you a short report on a couple of things that's happened in the last two weeks within U.S. Soccer and the Soccer Referee Committee, the board meeting today, just to give everybody a heads-up of where we are.

One of the most important things that are happening right now in the Federation, if you don't know, is we're going through a bid process to bid for the 2026 World Cup. It's a huge undertaking, huge responsibility. And the one thing about it is we're not guaranteed to get the

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1 bid. I mean, we need to work our butts off and 2 cross our T's and dot our I's to ensure that

3 we're going to get this bid.

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Unfortunately, the American political 4 scene doesn't help with the bid process. We are -- unfortunately, some people at the White 6 House made some comments that offend people 7 around the world, and in all seriousness, that doesn't help us as a nation who is trying to bid and get the votes from the people all over the 11 world.

So it's not going to be an easy process, even though we're only going against Morocco right now. But it's going to be an uphill battle for us to get that bid, as we saw in the last bid. So there are 123 days left before FIFA makes that decision.

So our World Cup Bid Committee is working tirelessly to get everything done, to get all these documents done, to get the bid package together.

The bid package will have probably a total of 70,000 pieces of information in that bid package.

Of course, the United States, we have

probably the best stadiums, the best infrastructure out there, but at the end of the day that really doesn't matter. The bid has to be perfect.

So what if we do -- what's on the line to get this World Cup bid? If we get the World Cup bid, there will be 5.8 million tickets sold in this country to watch games in the country -- not only for this country. This country and Canada and Mexico, as you all know, are doing a tri-bid.

The USA needs about 100,000 volunteers to help with this World Cup bid. About 75,000 people leading up to the bid, leading up to the World Cup, an additional 15 25,000 people to work during the World Cup. So 16 these are probably people that are sitting in 17 this room that will be utilized during that 18 event. 19

Our stadiums are probably one of the 20 21 best stadiums in the world. The one thing that's 22 good about us, we don't have to build stadiums, or we don't have to build anything. We have 23 everything in place already. We have got the 24 best stadiums in the world. And our stadiums

right now, we probably consider an average of 1

2 60,000 fans in our stadiums, with another 9,500

3 fans sitting in the luxury suites, and as you

know, some of these NFL stadiums now have these 4

5 really sophisticated luxury suites and sitting

areas for the VIPs.

So it's a big undertaking we're doing 7 right now, and we shouldn't take it for granted. 8 Like I said, it's us against Morocco. We're 9 trying to get this bid. We have to fight tooth 10 11 and nail and lobby our other countries. There's about 270 countries that will be voting, so we 12 have to convince at least 104 people, countries 13 to vote for us. 14

So it's going to be happening soon. Just keep your ears out for it. Again, it will have a tremendous impact on our sport in the United States.

We would have the next eight years, right, building up to that World Cup. And just imagine the potential of eight years of building up with excitement and fan events, and just different events all over the country, building up to the World Cup in the United States, how much interest is that going to generate for our

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sport?

2 So we're all going to get behind it. If you need any volunteers to do anything, raise 3 your hand, because at the end of the day, we all will benefit from the World Cup coming to the 5 United States. 6

So on that, today, we have -- well, before we get to that -- a couple of weeks ago -and I know it's of interest to a lot of people -there was a National Referee Committee meeting held in California. As people know, I chair the Referee Committee for U.S. Soccer, and just a couple of updates that went on at that meeting.

There was a good discussion around the policy, of course, the infamous policy that we all talked about, and we, as a committee, have agreed that at this point, let it stay where it

Sunil, myself, and Dan had agreed to, this is not something that we need to tackle at this time, and as a Referee Committee, we also agreed that we're not going to bring up that policy in the near future. So, in the interim what I had done is I had the USASA Referee Committee members, they worked on an alternative 21

policy to that policy, okay? 1

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2 And when I took it to our Board of 3 Directors, they looked at it, and at this point,

the Board of Directors' feeling were that it is a

sleeping giant. Let's not wake the sleeping

giant. Let's put the recommendation from the 6

7 Referee Committee on the shelf, and if U.S.

8 Soccer brings it up, then we will pull that off

the shelf and make our proposal to U.S. Soccer.

So right now, the sleeping giant is sleeping. Let it sleep. And I will give you my word that if I remain as Chairman of the Referee Committee, that will not be brought up at the Referee Committee meeting, as long as I'm there. So I heard you guys in Lake Tahoe. In my opinion, that policy has been laid to rest, so...

So another thing that I brought up at the Referee Committee meeting to help our organization, U.S. Soccer's referees have a, what they call the priority of games for referees. It's part of their policies. And the one thing 21

22 that's irked me forever is that U.S. Academy games have a higher priority than U.S. Adult 23

Soccer games, right? And I probably brought it 24

to the Referee Committee a couple of weeks ago 25

and told them and said, all of you people in this 2 room were ex-FIFA referees. Did you become a referee by doing youth games or by doing tough adult games? Without question, they all answered tough adult games, right? 5

So I said, so how can we, as a 6 7 Referee Committee, acknowledge that an Academy game has a higher priority on the list of games 8 than an Adult Division I game? So we had a discussion around that and took it to a vote, and 10 we lost on the vote, which didn't surprise me, 11 but I was hoping it was going to be passed. 12

So what -- an alternate proposal was made by Sandy Hunt and an alternate proposal was to at least put the Academy games and the Adult Division I games on, at the same level. So that passed.

18 So as of right now, U.S. Adult Games got a notch up, and they're equal to the priority 19 games, as a U.S. Academy game. 20

21 So the assignors out there that kind 22 of use the fact that well, you better do an Academy game, because it's a higher priority, 23

does no longer exist. So they're on equal 24 footing. So we're not done with it. I'm going

to continue to -- not to fight for it, but I just 1

2 want you people to know that, you know, we had

3 the vote. We had three members there that voted

for it: myself, Bill Davey, and Angelo Bratsis, 4

5 and that was a, three-year permanent votes, and

we lost on the vote. 6

7 So just being transparent on what happened, and let you know that you do have 8 committee members that keep trying to fight for 9 the best of the adult game, and, you know, we 10 11 just -- we've got to deal with other committee members there. 12

Just one thing that was brought up 13 there -- and correct me if I'm wrong, Bill --14 U.S. Soccer wants to change their classification 15 of referees. So they want to go from like a 16 17 grade 9, a grade 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, all the way down, the four classifications. So now you are going 18 to be a referee, a state referee, national 19 referee, and professional referee. So all these

20 grades you had 8, 7, 6, and 5s, all the way down 21

22 the line, will be changing, and we approved that, because that's pretty much how things are done 23

around the world. Most countries do not have all 24

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these grades. They have referee, a state, a 25

national, and then a professional.

1 2 So you will be seeing that coming down the pike in the next -- it was approved by 3 the committee, so that will be happening, 4 probably, in the, I would say, in the next year. 5

So that's the referee issues.

One thing that we did, when we went

to Philadelphia, and we had a historic first and I put together a meeting of all the four councils for U. S. Soccer, which has never been done before, so we actually had the Adult Council members, the Youth Council members, the Athletes Council members, and the Professional Council members, all in one room to discuss the future of

How can we, as councils -- and we all 16 17 have the same end game, to promote the game and make it the preeminent sport in America -- how 18 can we support each other to grow this game? If 19 we're all going to work in our little silos by 20

ourselves, we're never going to get anywhere. We 21 need support from each other and from one another 22

to grow this game.

I went to the Board of Directors meeting, and I made a motion 18 that based on our commissioners meeting and the 19 support we had in that room, to -- for a fee 20 reduction of 50 percent for youth and adults, 21 22 which meant 50 cents for youth, and a dollar that we would pay to the U.S. Soccer Federation. 23

24 We had a very good discussion in the room, and there was opposition, of course, a lot 25

rationale. The other rationale is, so what are

2 you going to do with the money? If we were to do

3 this, what is your plan? And what to do with

this money, right? 4

5 And I gave them the example of our liability insurance. I said, Well, we just got 6

7 hit with two major lawsuits that took our excess

8 liability fee from X to Z, and we couldn't afford

it any more, our members couldn't afford it. So 9

10 if we got this reduction in fees, we could still 11 provide that same excess liability insurance to

12 our members without having to raise fees, or not

dropping it as we have, all right? 13

So I made that case. It wasn't good enough. It was defeated. So that's where we are right now.

I'm just trying to see what else was there. What's that -- now, the question becomes -- and this is what Richard is asking, do we, as a group, want to bring it as a budget amendment on the floor tomorrow for this fee reduction?

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKERS: Yes. PRESIDENT MOTTA: It's a decision we need to make. I mean, it's politically, it's

1 of opposition. And when the vote came, when the

- 2 vote was taken, Sunil asked me if I wanted to
- withdraw the motion. I said no, I want a vote
- 4 taken. The vote was three for, which was myself,
- Richard Moeller and Jesse Harrell, the president 5
- of the youth, were the only three that were for 6
- it. One abstention, which was Carlos Cordeiro, 7

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
